WITHDRAW 4 TOWNSHIPS ROYALTY ON MINERALS

By an order-in-council passed by the Ontario government yesterday the rich cobalt mining district is withdrawn from sale or lease. It is the intention to adopt new regulations; and as this cannot be done except by parliament the district will be closed, except to prospectors, until the new policy is announced.
