PENNY-A-MILE TO-DAY FOR RAILWAY BOARD

Overhead Bridge May Be Erected at Sunnyside — Applications for More Tracks.

The Dominion railway commission yesterday put in a busy day and set the G.T.R. penny-a-mile case for hearing at 11 o'clock this morning.

Several matters of local interest were presented, including an application for additional tracks across Brock, West Lodge, Lansdowne, Wallace and Boyce, avenue and Dundas, Bloor and Maude streets.

The city applied for an order requiring the G.T.R. to stop all street crossings at Sunnyside during the summer months.

There was also an application for an order requiring trains to stop at the Yonge-street crossing. This was opposed, and testimony was offered to prove that a train of sixty empty cars, if stopped east of Yonge-street, would block nine streets and fourteen private crossings.

It was virtually decided that an overhead bridge should be erected at the Sunnyside crossing, but the city may be called upon to pay part of the cost.

WESTERN MINE WORKERS VICTIMS OF CONSPIRACY

Socialists Discuss Trial of Haywood and Associates for Murder of Governor.

The wrongs which the average workman has to endure from his employer was the chief topic last night at a mass meeting of workmen, which was ostensibly called to enlighten the public on the labor situation in Colorado and Idaho.

The Colorado situation was dealt with by F. Martin. He insisted that Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, the three members of the Western Federation of Miners, who are on trial for the murder of Governor Steiensen, were the victims of capitalistic influence. Evidence had been adduced time and again to show that the charges were the outcome of a conspiracy of the mine owners and that any murders that had been committed were chargeable to the mine owners, yet such were the conditions of government that innocent men might have to suffer for the guilty.

Mr. Martin warned his hearers against improvements in machinery, which, he said, generally meant that the operator had to manage two machines instead of one.

He spoke also in denunciation of child labor, which, he declared, had achieved such shocking proportions in the cotton mills of the continent that often a baby would be found operating a machine with one hand and nursing a doll with the other. There were over 2,000,000 children in the factories of the United States. In Canada he did not know the number, because the government was wise enough not to publish statistics.

Robert Roadhouse of Newcastle, Pa., also spoke, largely along the lines of Mr. Martin's address, and Mr. S. Brown then addressed the audience in Yiddish, many of these present not being able to speak or understand English.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT JOINS CITY IN APPEAL

Will Go to Privy Council to Upset Judgment in Level Crossings Case.

The Ontario government has notified the city that it will be a party in the appeal to the privy council against the judgment of the court of appeal in the level crossings case.

The old railway committee added the city with the cost of the protection of Dufferin, Bloor and Bathurst crossings. The total bill was placed at \$4000, but the city disputed the validity of the committee's order.

When the case was before the court the provincial government declined to be made a party to it, but afterwards they decided that it also affected their interests. The constitutional question as to whether the railway committee had the right to make the order has not been argued.

INJURED BY STREET CAR

James Wallace Suffering From Concussion of the Brain.

James Wallace, 45 years of age, 130 Manning-avenue, narrowly escaped death in a street car accident on West Queen-street at 6.15 o'clock last night. Wallace was riding his bicycle west on the north track, immediately west of Tereslay-street, when he was overtaken by Queen-street car No. 1035, driven by Motorman Elythe. He attempted to turn north into the roadway, but the car struck the rear wheel. Wallace was thrown to the pavement. He sustained a scalp wound 2 inches in length, and, when picked up, was bleeding profusely from his right ear. He was carried into a nearby drug-store, and Dr. E. H. Adams, soon called. Wallace is suffering from a concussion and hemorrhage of the brain. He was removed to his home.

Dr. Adams said that there was a possibility of a fracture at the base of the skull in which case the man's condition would be precarious. Wallace is a carpenter employed with the T. Eaton Company.

TO IMPROVE QUALITY OF STEEL RAIL PRODUCT

The Many Recent Accidents Induce Manufacturers and Railway Men to Investigate.

NEW YORK, May 10.—An important step has been taken by manufacturers of steel rails, and the railway companies, which make such extensive use of this commodity, to bring about an improvement in the steel rail product, thus giving better security to the public against accidents, and providing a higher grade article for the railroads.

This movement results from recent criticisms made by railway experts concerning the life and general durability of steel rails. It has been maintained that breakage has been more frequent of recent months and that there is a gradual deterioration in the product. Whether this is due to the inferior quality of the iron used, to the processes of manufacture, or to the immense strain of roughing tonnage is an open question.

With a view to reconciling all the divergent views, a committee of experts has now been appointed, both the railroads and the manufacturers of steel rails being represented on the committee. Judge Eibert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation, and in view a committee of experts, appointed by the American Railway Association are in consultation with a committee of experts representing the manufacturers. Every suggestion for the improvement of present conditions will be given careful consideration, and it is believed the manufacturers and railway managers will agree upon a standard of excellence that should not be questioned.

Judge Gary added that enquiries for steel rails for delivery in 1908 were coming in gradually. Two western railroads had already taken orders, and the demand for steel rails is generally accepted in the business world as a barometer of the industrial situation and of railroad development. For the present, however, Judge Gary does not consider the figures sufficiently important to permit an accurate gauge of the steel industry for 1908.
