The Board of Works Yesterday.

A written explanation by Commissioner Jones, in response to objections by Ald. Crane, was read at the Board of Works yesterday afternoon, with reference to the preference given the Fairbanks scale over the Wilson scale purchased for use at the western city stables. Mr. Jones stated that he had consulted with the chairman of the committee and the Engineer upon the matter and decided to purchase \$4000 worth of Fairbanks scales at \$12.50. The Wilson scales of the same capacity cost \$112. The Commissioner thought the Fairbanks scales well worth the difference and had bought a scale to Toronto.

Ald. Crane remarked that the letter should not be taken through his hat.

Wilson was a local man, asking no remuneration or other favors, and yet could not sell a scale to Toronto.

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ALPHA DELTA PHI.

Opening of the Convention in Toronto of the American and Canadian Greek Letter Men.

The first open meeting of the Convention of the Alpha Delta Phi, composed of delegates from 22 eastern American universities and colleges, and McGill and Toronto University, was held Thursday night in Association Hall.

Glowing addresses were given by the president, the chairman, Sir William Meredith, appeared with Professor Raymond, president of the American Association of Principals of the University of New York, and Colonel Sprague of New York, the member of the Union Chapter, the acting president, who made the opening address and mentioned the names of famous men who have been connected with the association, such as Edward Everett Hale, Phillips Brooks, Bishop Wilcox of Western New York, the president of Yale, Harvard and Johns Hopkins Universities and others.

The president then introduced Prof. Raymond, paying him a high tribute. In the interim the students and the delegates sang a welcome in Greek, followed by the singing of the national anthem. The delegates then sang the song of the association, which was "The Lost Chord," responding to a hearty cheer.

Prof. Raymond, in his introductory remarks, said as long as they worshipped the same God, while their conviction and sympathies met and flow together, English and American were essentially one, and no protective tariff can hinder them from mingling their ideas.

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SIX CHARGES AGAINST EMLAW.

Committed for Trial Yesterday—How He Was Captured by Constables Burns and Reid.

The charge of theft and bare breaking against Nelson Emlaw, alias Joseph Garbo, was heard before Magistrate Ellis yesterday afternoon, and the prisoner was committed for trial. There are six charges against him. For participation in these offences Robert Harrison was committed to the last county session, and is now in jail awaiting trial. Emlaw went to Stratford, then to Chicago, came back to Toronto, and was working near St. Thomas when he was captured by a constable by Constables Burns and Reid. William Annis, from whom Emlaw is charged with stealing boots and hats, was identified the boots and harness recovered. Constables Burns and Reid swore to getting the articles in a stable at 117 Queen-street east, where Emlaw, according to the constables, was seen to be in the room, Mr. Gordon appeared for the crown, Mr. Percy Paine for the prisoner.
