

TO-DAY'S MIMIC WARFARE

Toronto Will Be Stoutly Attacked and Vigorously Defended.

BATTLE OF HUMBER VALE

Two Thousand Troops Will Take Part in To-Day's Sham Fight—Constitution of the Respective Forces—Inspection and March Past Will be in High Park—Brilliant Staff Will Witness the Manoeuvres—How to Spend Thanksgiving Day.

This is Thanksgiving Day, the last of the public holidays of the year, save Christmas Day. Given favorable weather, it is one of the most enjoyable times in the calendar. It is emphatically a day of family reunions and of wholesome geniality. The ways in which the day may be spent are legion. Thankful for personal and national blessings, many will enter the courts of the Lord with songs and the voice of praise. But for the great majority of Toronto's citizens the interest of the day will centre in the military manoeuvres and sham-fight out in the west, in and beyond High Park. The East End and Valley of the Don have had their share of these annual evolutions, and it is only fitting that Ixington, Lambton Mills and Humber Vale should be honored by a visit of our citizen soldiers in all the pomp and circumstance of a real war.

About 2000 troops, representing the advance guard of an attacking and a defending army will take part in to-day's manoeuvres. The boundaries of the operations will be: Western, Ixington-avenue; Northern, Dundas-street, from the bridge to Ixington-avenue; southern, Lake Shore-road. The attacking force will assemble at the Amories at 8:30 a.m. and march to Ixington at 10:15 o'clock. It will consist of the Queen's Own Rifles, with Maxim gun, the 48th Highlanders, one squadron of the Royal Canadian Dragoons and one section of the Toronto Field Battery. Lieut.-Col. Delapierre will be in command, with Major Ross, brigade-major, and Lieut. McLean, R.R.C.I., orderly officer.

The defence of Toronto will rest with one squadron of the Governor-General's Body Guard, one section of the Toronto Field Battery, the Royal Grenadiers and the 13th Battalion of Hamilton, both with Maxim guns. Lieut.-Col. Mason, R.C.I., will command the force, with Major Leonard, R.C.I., brigade-major. The Grens will parade as early as 8:30, and they will march out to the Ixington-avenue at 10:15. Twenty-five rounds of blank ammunition will be issued to each man.

The details of the plan of campaign were communicated by the commanding officers to the officers and sergeants at the Amories in the night. The attacking force will march on the city by way of Dundas-street, and the encounter will take place along the Humber Valley. It is expected that the supreme effort of the day will be in the vicinity of the Humber-street bridge.

Inspection in High Park. The manoeuvres will probably be over before 2 o'clock. The parade following the fight will be in the northwest portion of High Park. Here the inspection will take place. Lieut.-Col. Otter will be in command, and the parade will line up in the following order:

First Brigade—13th Battalion and Royal Grenadiers, under Lieut.-Col. Mason. Second Brigade—48th Highlanders and G.O.R., under Lieut.-Col. Delapierre. The cavalry and artillery in line, the infantry in line of quarter columns, six yards intervals between units and brigades.

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For the march past, which is expected to take place at about 2 o'clock, the regimental march of each corps will be played in turn, and for the quarter column, that of the Queen's Own Rifles. The marching band will take the post of rear of the artillery during the inspection. High Park will doubtless be the favorite place of observation for the majority of the citizens. Manager Keating of the Toronto Railway Company has made arrangements for an effective service of cars running into the park. The Collegiate and the Carlton and College services, with extras, will all be thus requisitioned.

The annual garrison mess dinner, which gives a fitting climax to the day's manoeuvres, will be held in the Armouries at 7 o'clock. It is expected to be a brilliant affair, graced with the presence of Major-General Hutton and all the officers who took part in the day's proceedings. The theatre are sure to be crowded, and other entertainments that will receive their due meed of patronage are: The Brough-Harvey concert, in Masses Hall; Miss Mather's recital, in St. George's Hall; the public Thanksgiving supper, the church concerts and entertainments, notably those in Elm-street and Queen-street Methodist Churches; the annual concert in the Pavilion and Dingman's Hall; St. Mary's Catholic concert, in St. Andrew's Hall; and last, but not least, the boxing events in Mutual-street rink, the chief of which will be a bout between Jack Bennett and a yeti enough for every class as choice as the Thanksgiving fare on which the citizens will regale themselves, all thoughtful care being for one happy day banished.

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IN THE POLICE COURT. Clothes Line Thief Sent to Jail—An Unlicensed Baby Farmer Fined.

John and Henry Thackeray and James Walsh were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday on a charge of housebreaking. It is said that they entered the home of Richard Birmingham at 51 Parliament-street, about a month ago and stole a quantity of clothing. They pleaded not guilty, and were remanded for a week.

William Cummings wanted four months in jail, and the Magistrate complied with his wish.
