Miller Wins the Six Days' Cycling Race.

Collegiate Institute Team Defeat the Jubilee Hockeyists

Unknown Hockeyists Win in the Match With Wingham-Peterboro's Protest Disallowed - Cycling and Turf Events.

THE CANADIAN WON.

San Francisco, Feb. 20.—No more ever welcomed more heartily the close of a contest than the dozen remaining contestants in the international six-days' bicycle race at Mechanics' Pavilion on Sunday. It was a noisy but sympathetic crowd that was assembled. There was plenty of enthusiasm, too, when Miller, at the end of the 127th hour, rode his 2,000th mile at 2:25 1/2, unpaired. At 6:50 o'clock Sunday morning Miller was 14 hours 19 minutes ahead of his New York record. Nawn and Barnaby were repeatedly charged with energy by an electric battery, and came out to exhaust their false vitality in a wild sprint. The fight of the last half dozen hours has been between Fredericks and Aaronson for second place. All through Saturday night and Sunday the poor fellows, jaded and worn, with drawn faces and staring eyes, circled the track, sometimes at a snail's pace and then again under the influence of inspiring music by the band and the urging of friendly voices, the riders would increase their speed for a few laps and then drop back into the old rut. The race was ended at 10:15 last night, 39 minutes ahead of time. At the end of 143rd hour at 9:54, all the riders retired for a few minutes, and returned long enough only to make a showing. The finalists: Miller, 2,192 miles; Aaronson, 2,062; Fredericks, 2,062; Hale, 2,062; Nawn, 2,012; Alberts, 1,928; Barnaby, 1,792; Pilkington, 1,779; Lawson, 1,637; Julius, 1,614; Ashing, 1,600.

BANK ROBBERY AT BLENHEIM

Burglars Blew Out the Side of a Building—Are Supposed to Have Got Away With Several Thousand Dollars—Escaped in a Carriage.

Blenheim, Ont., Feb. 20.—The residents of this town were very much excited Friday morning to learn that the bank of J. R. Powell had been entered and robbed.

It is supposed that the robbers were aware that there were several thousand dollars in the safe. After gaining entrance to the bank, they drilled a hole in the safe, but put an over-charge of some explosive in the hole, with the result that the side of the building was blown out. The explosion was heard all over the town, but before any person could reach the scene the robbers had secured the money and boarded a hand-car, on which they rode out about four miles toward Chatham. Then they abandoned the car and escaped in a carriage, which had evidently been left at that point for them.

ELECTRICITY USED BY ROBBERS.

Oberlin, Ohio, Feb. 20.—Burglars got into the vault of the Oberlin Banking Company, Friday morning, and connected the trolley wire of the Cleveland and Ohio electric road, which runs directly past the bank, to a drill machine to operate on the outside door of the vault. They blew the interior of the vault into a thousand pieces, but no money was secured, as the robbers failed to get into the big safe for lack of time.

"LOOKED OUT"

And a Monkey Wrench Fell and Smashed His Nose.

Detroit, Feb. 20.—A telephone employee, who was at the corner of Michigan and Warren avenues Saturday afternoon, one of them was at the top of a pole, and the other was standing almost directly beneath. "Look out!" shouted the man from his perch, as an object took a rapid downward course.

The other man promptly looked up. A monkey wrench, which was the object that was coming down like a shooting star, struck him with terrific force in the face. The injured man was taken to the office of Dr. D. H. O'Donnell, where it was found that his nose was almost severed and the forehead cut through to the skull. The doctor says the man's cap saved him a fracture of the skull. He sewed up the wounds and sent his patient home. His name is George E. Harrison.

George Thorne, councillor, Port Stanley, died in that village Friday morning after a two weeks' illness, of lung trouble, aged 53 years. He leaves a widow, three daughters and one son.

One of the oldest residents of Paris, in the person of Mr. Edmund Axton, is dead at his residence, West Broadway, at the ripe old age of 85 years. Mr. Axton had been a resident of Paris for over 40 years.

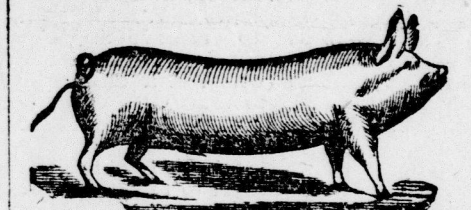
