QUAINT CHARACTER DIES

'Mayor of Barefoot Square" Was Once Pal of Millionaires.

Alllegheny, Pa., Nov. 6.—One of the famous old patriarchs of this city passed away last night. William G. Richards, aged 76 years, better known as "Sheelle Richards, the "Mayor of Barefoot Square." Allegheny, is dead at his home, 524 Grant Democrat, by a margin of 9,772. avenue. Richards was one of the best known characters in Allegheny. He was foot boy with this pair on the same place which is now known as "Barefoot Square." While Carnegie and Phipps went out and mained in the vicinity of "Barefoot quare," and he later became one of its landmarks. He was always a favorite with Andrew Carnegie, who pensioned him some years ago.
