MUCH MINERAL IN NORTH COUNTRY

Copper, Iron, Cobalt and Silver at Lake Abitibi.

INDUSTRIOUS PROSPECTORS

Have Made Many Finds, Some of Which Will No Doubt Prove Very Valuable.

Cobalt, Sept. 16.—Several prospectors who have recently made a tour through the northern country as far as Lake Abitibi give very glowing reports of the finds of copper, iron, cobalt and silver in that part of the country between Lake Des Quinze, Lake Abitibi, and Kenogesis River.

Although it has been said that there are no indications of gold existing in great abundance in any part of this country, yet fields of the above-mentioned minerals have recently been made to such an extent that it is said the status of this section of territory as a mining country is almost perfectly assured. The operation of the Del Norte Smelting and Refining Company in Ville Marie will appear partially to confirm this fact. This company have a large force of men employed here erecting a smelter. The town of Ville Marie has voted a bonus of eight thousand dollars to the new company, and the property and plant is to be exempted from taxes for twenty years. Secondly, ample evidence of the bright future of this country is afforded by the fact that the town of Ville Marie itself, as well as several small settlements to the north and south, on the shores of Lake Temiskaming, are rapidly becoming the homes of a large number of those who are seeking their fortune in the wilds of North Ontario.

Finds of Copper.

A considerable quantity of copper has recently been found in the vicinity of Fabre, which is a small village eight miles south of Ville Marie. Assays of the ore have shown this metal to run as high as 20 per cent. The stripping of several calcite veins in this region has shown an immense quantity of cobalt bloom, and development work in the main has started here with a vengeance.

Near the village of Guigues, which is a small settlement about ten miles to the north of Ville Marie, discoveries of a similar nature have recently been made, as also some native silver. Here, too, considerable development work is being done by the individual prospector.

Mica Also.

At Kuin Bay, which lies about 20 miles northeast of Ville Marie, there is to be found abundance of copper and some silver, as well as traces of gold, though the average assays from the latter have been known to show only \$5 to the ton. According to experienced prospectors, the general formation of this country indicates a good mineral bearing territory. It is a granite-schist. In the neighborhood of Lake Des Quinze and this Expanse a considerable number of prospectors have staked, and are developing their copper discoveries. The average run of the copper ore in this district is reported to be 15 per cent. Several who have gone further into the country and up the Ottawa from Lake Expanse report several smaller discoveries of copper. The general formation of the country on the Ottawa above Lake Expanse is pegmatite rock, with considerable white and green feldspar. A new feature in this part of the country is the discovery of mica in the feldspar in its purest form. The mica appears in flakes from one-quarter of an inch to one inch square, and in some places it is to be seen as large as four inches square. This is reported to be of the very best quality, and there is a theory among prospectors and mining men of this vicinity that somewhere or other in that section of the country there exists a huge mica lode.

Some Gold Finds.

There are reports of gold discoveries in the vicinity of Turnback Lake, and several who have been formerly employed by the Transcontinental Railway report that discoveries of gold have been made thirty-five miles north of Turnback Lake, near to what is known as Spirit Lake, which is within one mile of the proposed route of the Transcontinental Railway.

Without going so far away from civilization, Opatica Lake, which is on the canoe route between Lake Des Quinze and Lake Abitibi, about thirteen miles east of Larder Lake, has been the scene of gold discoveries. The King of the North Mining Company, recently incorporated, are operating in this region, developing their several claims, and they are at the present time considering the advisability of installing a free-milling plant. It might also be mentioned that going north from the canoe route on Lake Opatica, and crossing the Height of Land, brings one to Lake Ogatawagami, about thirteen miles southeast

of Lake Abitibi. All through this region there have been several traces of gold discovered and large numbers of prospectors have recently gone in here.

JAPAN SATISFIED

Komura Feels Sure Vancouver Rioters Will Be Punished.

London, Sept. 16.—Baron Komura, the Japanese ambassador to Great Britain, who has just returned to London after an absence in the country, called on Sir Edward Grey at the foreign office this afternoon, and discussed the anti-Oriental disturbances at Vancouver. The ambassador took with him long dispatches which he received from the Japanese consuls at Vancouver and Ottawa, and it is understood, assured the Foreign Secretary that Japan had the greatest confidence that the Canadians would punish those who were responsible for the attacks on the Japanese, and was satisfied with the steps in that direction already taken.

THREE KILLED BY DYNAMITE

Cheboygan Boys Shoot Into Warehouse Containing Explosive.

Cheboygan, Mich., Sept. 16.—With a terrific detonation which blew out practically every window light in this city and covered the people who were attending services in the Congregational Church with plaster from the ceiling, a warehouse belonging to the Post Hardware Company, which contained fourteen 25-pound packages of dynamite, exploded this morning killing Leslie Ehret, 18 years old, Bert Simmons, 18, and Clifford Simmons, 17.

The three young men had been hunting several days together and this morning left town and walked along the railroad track, shooting whatever game they saw. They reached the woods about a mile from the town and noticing a small house, decided to shoot at it. The first bullet fired at it exploded the dynamite.

With the shock of the explosion the entire population of the city rushed to the scene and were horrified to find the bodies of the victims lying in shreds and hanging from the limbs of trees in the vicinity. Trees and bushes were uprooted for a distance of five rods in every direction and a hole twenty feet across was torn in the ground where the house had stood.

Young Ehret graduated from high school last summer and was all ready to enter the U. of M. Sept. 18. His mother is nearly distracted by the accident.

BOTHA SAYS BOERS LOYAL TO ENGLAND

Warns Some Members of British Parliament to Mind Their Own Business.

Johannesburg, Sept. 16.—General Botha, the Premier, today visited Standerton, where he was welcomed by the municipality.

He declared that he could not adequately express his feelings concerning his recent visit to England. In spirit, Englishmen meant well to the Transvaal. It was a spirit of friendship and brotherhood, and he hoped that the inhabitants of the Transvaal would foster that spirit. He set himself the task of inducing concord between the two races.

Addressing the school children, General Botha said that feelings of suspicion should be expelled from the school benches. All should assist in building up a great nation under the British flag.

At a meeting of his constituents, the Premier stated that he regretted the attitude of many members of the Imperial Parliament, and he wished they would allow the Transvaal to mind its own affairs.

Some members of Parliament looked on the people of the Transvaal as their enemies, and it was high time that such a state of affairs should cease. The Transvaal would not allow them to take away one iota of the privileges received.

The education bill was a compromise tending to the amalgamation of the two people, who would take out of the past only that which was great, and would co-operate with a view to forming a great nation.

Referring to the loan, General Botha said he had told the Imperial Government that it would be impossible to develop the country without such an advance. The Opposition had cried out that a bargain had been struck, but he had discussed the loan in the clearest manner, and there was no question of a bargain.

He was most strongly convinced that the Chinese was unnecessary. The information at the disposal of the Government showed that there were thousands and thousands of Kaffirs in South Africa in excess of the number required in the mines, and during the last year 30,000 more than were wanted had applied for work, while the Government was receiving applications from thousands of others. The Government intended to put an end to the repatriation debate.

After maintaining that the presentation of the Cullinan diamond to the King was most correct, General Botha in an eloquent peroration, made a plea for reconciliation. "We are," he said, "only a small white population, and we must take the hand of brotherhood in the march of progress."

A NEW AIRSHIP FOR THE ARMY

After Two Years' Experiments Machine Is Now Ready for Final Tests.

Rome, Sept. 16.—One of the most unforeseen occurrences within the next fortnight Aldershot will see the first of the British fleet of military airships floating over it.

For two years the work of building a military airship has been in progress, both Colonel Templar and Colonel Capper, R. E., having been engaged in the task. The latter is now in command of the aerial section, but Colonel Templar is still consulted and frequently visits the establishment. Progress was very slow until recently, when the great development of Continental airships gave an impetus to English designers. Since then the work has proceeded rapidly.

Somewhat of French Type.

The new airship will probably be found to approximate to the type of the French La Patrie. A sausage-shaped balloon, made of the best material and heavily lacquered, carries a light framework of steel and bamboo. The envelope is of great lifting power, and is nearly eighty feet in length by thirty feet in diameter. Both planes and fan propellers are used in the direction and propulsion of the airship, and the models tried have in a remarkable degree answered their helm, a structure similar to that on La Patrie.

Some useful suggestions have been obtained from the German airships, with whose construction the Aldershot specialist staff are familiar.

Petrol will be the motive power in the engines, which are of the motor type. Unfortunately there has been some trouble with these, and the experts are working hard to lessen their liability to strain. The difficulties are now surmounted and there is every prospect that a greatly improved engine will result. Already the motor has been used in an advance on the French and German engines. It is light, and promises to be very reliable.

Nothing definite is fixed as to the trial trip of the new airship, but it will be first tried in calm weather. It is suggested that it should be called the Edward VI. because the King inspected it some time ago.

How the Secret Is Kept.

The new airship is lodged in a huge shed on the Swans road, which forms part of the large balloon factory which Aldershot possesses. The building for the construction of the airship is of a peculiar shape, rising to a peculiar shape, rising to a clerestory roof. The lighting is through windows high up in the zinc walls, so that no one can see what is inside, except by the use of a forty-foot ladder. Strict guard is kept over the whole of the balloon establishment.

Colonel Capper has a considerable staff at work in his department, where much experimenting is going on in other ways than on the war machine. All his men manifest the keenest interest in the success of the new airship, and are loyally co-operating to prevent valuable details of its construction leaking out. So keenly are they concerned that it is not advisable for any one of them to appear to verify a near the balloon factories. Apart from the aeroplane, Colonel Capper has on hand a large number of experimental war kites. These are being built in a smaller shed in front of that containing the airship. The kites are the invention of Mr. Cody, a United States subject, who, with his two sons, has been taken into the service of the British Government. Another gentleman engaged on the airship has a quite unofficial position, but acts as the superintending engineer.

REJECTED LOVER'S AWFUL REVENGE

Sets Fire to Cottage in Which the Woman and Three Others Slept.

London, Sept. 16.—Unless something diabolical crimes in the annals of modern Italy has just been committed in Fondi, in the province of Caserta.

A young woman named Diade, by common consent was the prettiest of the village maidens, had been pestered for a couple of years past by the unwelcome attentions of a local shepherd, Vincenzo de Silvestro, aged 22, with whom her relatives had dissuaded her from having anything to do, as he was a fellow of illfame, who had been in prison for thieving. He had also served a sentence of ten months' imprisonment for a brutal attempt to seduce Diade, whose parents had prosecuted him.

De Silvestro vowed to exterminate the whole family, so Diade, as a precautionary measure, bought a revolver and practiced shooting, her tormentor being meanwhile safe in prison.

A Terrible Vengeance.

On the expiration of his sentence De Silvestro bided his time till the actual anniversary of his offense, when he once more confronted Diade, demanding she should go and live with him. He received a negative answer.

A few days later De Silvestro went forth to a thatched cottage on the moor, where Diade was passing the night in company with an old aunt, over 80 years of age, her 13-year-old cousin and her little sister, aged 11. Having securely barricaded the only two available exits, he piled straw at the four corners and saturated the wooden exterior with paraffin, and then set the whole ablaze.

In his nefarious business he was assisted by another youthful ex-criminal named Bellone, only 19, who knew nothing of the circumstances, but aided out of motives of mere sport. Both guarded the exits with loaded guns till the piercing shrieks of the victims were stifled in death.

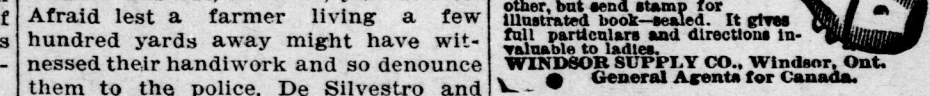
