MAJOR WILSON BACK

London Doctor Home on Furlough, Declares "Everyone Cheery" Overseas.

Major Cameron Wilson, A. M. C., is home from overseas. He arrived here Thursday, accompanied by his wife, who has been nursing in England while her husband was on duty in France.

Dr. Wilson is home on sick furlough. He says he is glad to get the rest. He left France in February, and was in England up to the time of his departure for Canada.

This is Major Wilson's second furlough. After coming back the first time, having gone with the 1st Continental, he returned as junior surgeon of the Western (University) Stationary Hospital. He was then stationed at Calais, and saw much of the Allied preparation for the threatened German offensive. These preparations led no doubt in his mind as to the ability of the Allies to meet any enemy assault.

"Everyone is cheery over there," he said, in giving his impressions of the people overseas as standing the conflict.

DROPS DEAD AFTER HURRYING TO SIDE OF FAINTING WIFE

Prominent District Man Succumbs Suddenly Thursday Night.

Hearing that his wife had fainted suddenly, Charles E. Trebilcock of this city, for many years one of the best-known farmers of London Township, died of heart failure caused by over-exertion in going to her assistance at 11 o'clock last night. Mr. Trebilcock was visiting at the residence of his son-in-law, J. A. Buchanan, 156 Central avenue. He was informed that Mrs. Trebilcock was suffering from a fainting spell, and rushed upstairs to her aid, dying from his effort a few minutes later.

Mr. Trebilcock was 72 years old. He was a director of the Western Fair board for several years, and also a member of the Eastern Middlesex Agricultural Society.

Born in Cornwall, England, he came to Canada in his infancy, opening up a butcher business on the local market about 1864. About fifty years ago he decided to become a farmer, and until two years ago was one of the best-known agriculturists in London Township.

His farm on the third concession of London Township was one of the best in the district. During his long experience in agricultural work he became known throughout Ontario as one of the most progressive pioneer farmers and stock-raisers.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Trebilcock, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Robert H. Hackett, Mrs. W. A. Hackett, and Mrs. W. A. Hackett.

The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon from the residence of his son-in-law, J. A. Buchanan, 156 Central avenue. The services will be conducted at 2:30 o'clock by Rev. Dr. Louis Barker of Colborne Street Methodist Church. Interment will be made at Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

MEET HERE SATURDAY

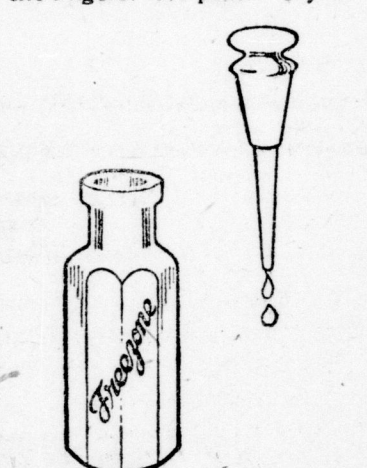

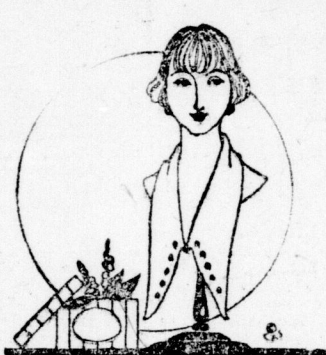
