

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 26.—Shantrock IV, the big green sloop with which Sir Thomas Lipton hopes today to lift the America's Cup, sped first across the line today at the start of the fifth international yacht race, which will decide the 1920 series. Starting on the first 15-mile leg of her 30-mile course, a run south by west, half west out to sea. Shamrock passed over the starting line at the Amprose Channel lightship.
