CANADIAN ART UNION
LOTTERY MEN INDICTED

Were Driven From Canada by Provincial Inspectors and Broke Out in Kentucky.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 6.—(Special).—Eleven officials of the Fort Erie, Ont., lottery, known as "The Canadian Art Union," were indicted by a United States grand jury to-day at Richmond, Ky. The men indicted are H. W. Armstrong, Louis Gatto, John Krempf, James Doll, John Ellis, Lancy Long, R. R. Jamieson, Maurice Richmond, Charles E. Wells, Thomas Dawson and John Weidener.

These men, who are wealthy Americans, operated this lottery at Fort Erie for a number of years. They were brought up for trial by the late Inspector of Provincial Detectives John Murray, but no conviction was obtained against them.

Inspector William Greer brought them before the police magistrate at Niagara Falls, Ont., in the spring of 1906, when they were fined \$2,000. The following year they were arraigned at Welland, Ont., and pleaded guilty. Sentence was suspended upon the promise that they would not again operate in Canada. This promise has been kept.

Operations in the United States have been general, however, and Inspector Greer has been co-operating with the American authorities in gathering information upon which the present prosecution is based.

GODERICH DIVISION BLOCKED
C.P.R. to Make No Further Effort Till Storm Abates.

GUELPH, Feb. 6.—(Special).—The situation on the Goderich division of the C.P.R. is becoming acute. Not only is the line completely at the mercy of the elements, but the men and engines sent out to clear a way are now completely stopped up. It is impossible for them either to go ahead or return, and consequently the men are now waiting patiently for the storm to abate. The C.P.R. will make no further efforts to clear the line until the storm ceases.

A despatch which states that seven engines are tied up within a few miles of there. Several men were nearly frozen between Walton and Beckett last night, and it is a miracle that any of them still live. They were engaged in shovelling when the cold became so intense that one man dropped. Unable to get out of the rapidly drifting snow, the others were nearly frozen before their cries attracted others to the spot.

The men are suffering all manner of hardships. A gang were engaged yesterday afternoon in the work of digging, getting seven miles out. They then had to tramp back the full distance, finding that the elements had in the meantime undone all their work. It had drifted in behind them and the tracks were again covered.

Hamilton Happenings

OUTRAGE SAYS 'MURDERMAN' WHO DIDN'T SHOVEL SNOW

Big Eight Room Addition to Sophia Street School—A Citizen's Offer.

HAMILTON, Feb. 6.—(Special).—According to the agreement reached at the finance committee this afternoon, the city will seek legislation giving Hamilton the right to have a board of control without submitting the question to the ratepayers. A number of agreements will be limited to 10.

The salary of R. V. Matthews, a receiver in the tax collector's office, will be increased from \$1100 to \$1200 a year. All salary increases and the estimates will be considered at an internal meeting of the aldermen.

The request of the Trades and Labor Council for the appointment of a plumbing inspector was turned down. A committee was appointed to consider the question of establishing a children's shelter.

Ald. H. G. Wright, who was fined for not clearing his walk, complained that it was an outrage to bring ladies into the police court on a charge of that kind. He thought the finance committee should refund all the fines. He also complained because the magistrate took the word of a policeman over that of a citizen, and because the police neglected to clean the snow from a crossing in front of the patrol station.

The sum of \$5000 will be included in the estimates for a sanatorium hospital and \$500 will be granted to the widow of the late Fireman Green.

The library board will take steps to improve the ventilation of the library. More School Accommodation.

The building committee of the board of education agreed this evening to recommend the board to make an eight-room addition to the Sophia-street school at a cost of about \$30,000.

A citizen who made it a condition to his offer that his name should be kept a secret offered thru Drill Instructor Higgins to give two banners for basketball for competing teams. The classes of the different schools, the contest to take place in May, the prizes to carry with them a free trip to Niagara. The offer was accepted.

A special committee was named to consider a scheme to start orchestral classes in the school for the year. The amount of fees collected in the schools for January amounted to only \$700, as compared with \$175 collected in the same month last year. The fee charged for the first class for instruction in the night classes will be raised from 50 cents to \$1 a month.

In connection with the laymen's missionary campaign a meeting for men was held this evening in Wesley church. The speakers were W. T. Ellis and J. Campbell White.

Olympic Candidates.

Those behind the scheme send athletes to the Olympic games in London had a meeting at the Hotel Royal this evening. Nothing definite was decided upon, but another meeting will be held in two weeks.

The magistrate has taken steps to have the Ontario road reported. Harry M. Kent, a G.T.R. brakeman, who lost two legs while coupling cars at Oakville last November, is suing the company for damages.

Archibald E. Smith, Rainy River, and Miss Lillian, daughter of Daniel Crosswell, Bertown, were married last evening.

Granted a Divorce.

A Buffalo despatch states that Mrs. Anna Freeborn has been granted a divorce from her husband, John Freeborn, a former member of the Tiger football team.

About 150 of the destitute foreigners of the city have secured employment on the Grand Trunk Pacific, and a local employment agency is looking for more hands for this work.

Robert White, a member of the Britannia baseball team, and Miss Pearl Fenwick, who married last evening at St. Patrick's church.

A horse and rig which had fallen over the mountain near the Beckett drive were discovered this morning. The horse was dead.

It is said that William Armstrong was in a position on the police board now that he has been appointed a license commissioner.

Horace Symington, the young man who committed suicide at Paris on account of trouble with his fiancée, resided at 384 North Victoria-avenue with his mother. He was 21 years of age, and until about a week ago was employed as a machinist at the Otis-Fensholt Elevator Company's works.

Reports received at the booking office of A. J. Small yesterday afternoon state that the Union Amusement Company was tied up at Blackwater Junction, on the way from Orillia to Peterboro. "Jerry From Kerry" troupe were stalled at Lorneville on their way from Peterboro to Lindsay, and "When Knighthood Was in Flower" were unable to get away from Harrisburg to make Guelph.

On Wednesday night the latter troupe arrived at Berlin, but their baggage didn't, and they acted in the most ludicrous and unprofessional manner, endeavoring to portray characters of days of old. Their evident effort to give the best performance under the circumstances caught the audience, who were liberal in applause and highly pleased with the show.

A Funeral on Snowshoes.

Because of the snow blockade, an unusual incident occurred in connection with a funeral near Alexandria on Sunday. The pall-bearers going to the grave on snowshoes and drawing the casket on a toboggan. While on the way the Union Amusement Company, which was carrying the casket from the hearse, they put it on a toboggan, strapped on their snowshoes, and drew the toboggan to the cemetery. The men took place while the mourners stood about on their snowshoes and nudged up to the casket.

BRAMPTON.—For the first time in thirteen years all trains were stopped by the snow.
