LABOR PARTY ENDORSES EXTENSION OF POLLING

World's Editorial Approved—Workmen Disfranchised Because Cannot Reach Polling Places.

Editor World: The Independent Political Labor Party of Toronto at a meeting June 10 passed the following resolution:

"That this party support the efforts of the Toronto World, as explained in a recent editorial of that paper, to the effect that the polls be left open on election day till 7 or 8 p.m., in order to give the working people an opportunity to get to the polling place after work hours.

It is essential, particularly in large centres of population, that the hours of polling should be extended if the workingman is not going to be practically disfranchised.

From information which is reaching The World office daily it is clear that Joseph Russell would have been elected in East Toronto if the workingman had had a chance to poll his vote.

Many workingmen who live as far out as Dovercourt or Mimico could not vote at all, because they could not leave their work until after the polls were closed.

The business man, too, who usually leaves his office by 8 o'clock, is greatly inconvenienced and in many cases does not vote at all. If the polls were opened at 8 a.m. he could vote and then proceed to business. The hours of polling should be extended from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Then the workingman could go home to his supper and then proceed to exercise his franchise.

Whatever the object may have been in fixing the hours from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., its effect, unquestionably, in Toronto is to keep the workingman out of his vote.

BILLS PASS IN COMMONS.

Yukon, Immigration, Patent Medicines and Fruit Marks Discussed.

OTTAWA, June 15.—(Special.)—Several government bills were put thru to-day. When the house opened Sir Wilfrid announced that additional government legislation will include bills to amend the Criminal Courts Act; to amend the Judges Act; an act respecting actions in the territories; an act to rectify certain errors in the revised statutes; and an act to amend the Railway Act.

Mr. Oliver's Yukon Act amendment was taken up in the afternoon. The object is to make the Yukon Council wholly executive and responsible for legislation, while the federal government will be responsible for administration. The bill was passed.

An amendment to the Chinese Immigration Act to define the term "immigrant" was next put thru. Mr. Oliver explained that it had been proposed to exempt men not entitled to it were securing exemption from head tax. The amendment also provides for punishment and deportation.

Mr. Templeton moved the second reading of his bill respecting proprietary and patent medicines. The bill is not so drastic as the legislation introduced last session. It provides for absolute suppression of cocaine and excessive use of alcohol, and a manufacturer puts on the label the formula, the medicine will not come under the act, while if certain names are used they will have to be named on the label. The bill was referred to a committee composed of Mr. Templeman, Mr. McIntyre (Perth), Dr. Spruue, Dr. Beland and Dr. Chisholm (Huron).

Mr. Fisher's amendment to the Inspection and Sale Act showed reduced penalties for infringement of the Fruit Marks Act. For the first offence the penalty is not to exceed \$25; for the second offence \$50, and for the third offence \$200. The bill passed.

In answering members, it was stated that Kenneth Falconer is entitled to \$42,315 for re-organizing the bookkeeping of the marine department under an amendment to the Niagara St. Catharines and Toronto Railway bill requiring elucidation, the bill stands over.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH.

James Parrott Did Not End His Own Life, Jury Finds.

Coroner Rowe's jury, after hearing a number of witnesses yesterday, came to the conclusion that James Parrott's death by drowning was accidental, and not due to his own design.

The son's evidence and that of others went to show that deceased was not in desperate straits, while it was a custom of his to go to the water front. The funeral will take place this morning from Washington's undertaking rooms to the Necropolis.

The son denied that his father assigned his business in the old country. It was a straight sale.

Wanted Heart's Blood.
HAVANA, June 15.—Victor Nakar, a negro lad, arrested on the charge of complicity in the kidnapping of Luisa Vandes, a white child, has confessed that the girl was the victim of a band of brujos, or negro wizards.

The girl was murdered for the purpose of using the blood of her heart to cure an old negro of consumption.

Oldest Voter for the Youngest Candidate.

"The Village Blacksmith"

This Famous Painting Will Be on Exhibition All This and Next Week on the Furniture Floor.

"THE VILLAGE BLACKSMITH"
By H. de Mareau, the Great French Artist.

The size of the canvas is 7 x 8 feet and it was painted in a blacksmith's shop in Lyons, France. The public did not see it for nearly a year afterward. Mareau was a very poor man, and at the time of his death was indebted to the blacksmith 100 francs for his services as a model and the use of his shop. The blacksmith, anxious to secure what was due to him, called upon the widow and informed her of the existence of the picture, and she at once endeavored to sell it. After showing it to a number of art dealers in Paris, she was offered \$2500.00 for it by M. Doubette, and it received a bronze medal and was resold for \$12,500.00. It has changed hands five times since, each time the price increasing. The present owner paid \$45,000.00 for the canvas.
