FIGHT PICTURES CASE
TO BE AIRED IN COURT
Chicago, July 27.—Unless Mayor DuSoy today consents to the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures in Chicago, John J. Jones, will institute mandamus proceedings in the courts against the mayor and Chief of Police Stewart in order to compel the issuance of the necessary permit. Jones who has paid \$60,000 for the exclusive rights to the Reno fight pictures in Illinois, reached his decision to take the matter into the courts after making a formal application yesterday, first to the chief and then to the mayor for the required permit.

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YOUNG CORBETT FINED
New York, July 27.—William Rotwell, better known as "Young Corbett," the pugilist, pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct in the west side court today and was fined \$5. He was paroled until tomorrow as he did not have the money with him. Rotwell was having an argument with some negro about the comparative merits of Johnson and the white fighters. When told to move on by a policeman Corbett declined to do so and was arrested.
