

GETTING READY FOR GRAND OPENING OF BOWLING SEASON

THOUSANDS OF FANS EAGER TO TRY FOR STRIKES AND SPARES

Season Is Expected To Be One Of The Best Since The Game Was Introduced Here Years Ago

THOUSANDS of bowling fans throughout the city are looking forward with keen anticipation for the grand opening of the alleys which is to take place in the near future. After the long lay-off during the summer months they are eager to again step on the approach, select a ball and send it crashing into the candles. Candle pin bowling is one of the most popular pastimes in this city, thousands of men, young and old, in addition to many women, participating. This season is expected to be one of the best since the game was introduced here many years ago. In anticipation of this the owners of the four largest alleys have dipped down into their pockets and paid out large sums to have them put in the best condition possible. As a result the alleys will be faster and many of the old records will undoubtedly go by the boards.

The Y. M. C. I. Black's and Victoria alleys are still in the hands of renovators and will be ready at the end of this month or early in September to open their doors to the candle pin artists. The Imperial alleys have been operating all summer and have enjoyed one of the most lucrative seasons since they opened for business.

Touching Every Sport

The Admiral Beatty Hotel has not only proven a strong incentive to hold tourists in this city, but, in addition, has been a boon to the bowling game. Tourists from the States, eager to enjoy daily exercise, have patronized the Imperial alleys, and daily large numbers would congregate there to have a shot at the pins. Men and women alike went to the alleys, and the high scores they turned in showed they are adepts at the game.

Getting Alleys Ready

The Y. M. C. I. alleys are being thoroughly overhauled. All four are being planned, new boards set in where needed and other changes and improvements made. The Victoria alleys have been in the hands of a crew of men for some time and are said to be in splendid condition for the opening of the season. Black's are now receiving their finishing touches after a thorough planning and overhauling. New concrete supports have been placed around and under the building, and the interior is being decorated. As a result it will not be long until the familiar cry, "Spot No. 7," "Take out your gutter wood," etc., will be heard.

Put Up Hard Fight In Maritime Title Meet

DARTMOUTH, N. S., Aug. 21—All trophies emblematic of Maritime tennis honors for 1924, went to Nova Scotia as a result of the inter-provincial play-off here today. Two title-holders were dethroned and one new star appeared in the Maritime tennis firmament in the person of Lieut. J. C. Edwards, of the South End Club, Halifax, who captured honors in singles, this morning and, paired with James Butler, of Bedford, wrested the doubles title from the 1924 champion team, H. L. Short and P. J. Hallisley, of Rothesay, N. B.

Breath-Taking Play

The most breath-taking play of the day was seen in the men's doubles in which Edwards and Butler, of Halifax, defeated Short and Hallisley, the New Brunswick champions after five sets of thrilling tennis. The scores were 6-1, 4-6, 5-7, 6-1, 6-3. Hallisley was the particular star in this match, his powerful driving and unusually canny work around the net being a feature. Short played good tennis, but those who witnessed his play were unanimous in the belief that he was not on his usual game. Edwards played consistently well throughout the day and Butler made his usual killings at the net, his overhead work being deadly for his opponents.

Ladies' Doubles

The second match of the afternoon found Miss Margaret Henderson and Miss Lois Fairweather, of Rothesay, facing Miss Hilda Douglas and Miss Winnifred McFarlane, of Halifax, for ladies' doubles honors. The first set went to the Nova Scotia ladies by a score of 6-1. The Rothesay pair then drew level in the second set, both following all shots to the net. After four all and chances looked good for the youthful New Brunswick pair coming through, but they were unable to outguess the more experienced pair, who took the set 6-4 and the title.

Mixed Doubles

New Brunswick's second best chance of the day came in the mixed doubles which brought together J. P. McNeil and Miss Jean Knight, of Rothesay, and James Butler and Miss Dorothy Symonds, of Bedford. The latter pair winning in straight sets by scores, 6-3, 6-5, with the score three to one in favor of the visitors in the first set, and both playing strongly, the possibilities of a win looked fair. MACKMEN SEE M

TO HAVE CRACKED

Pitchers Wild and Ineffective and The Team's Hitting is Weak.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22—Beaten in five successive games, the Philadelphia Athletics today were on the verge of a total collapse such as wrecked earlier season's hopes for Connie Mack in previous years.

Defeat of the youthful Quaker City combination yesterday by the Chicago White Sox, 8 to 2, bore unmistakable signs of cracking on the part of Mack's entry. Pitchers were wild and ineffectively against Collins' club, team hitting continued weak, while the defense was unsteady at crucial periods.

The tumble of Philadelphia, however, lost the club no further ground in the American League race. Washington, one game in the lead, likewise went down to defeat at the hands of Detroit, as Coveleskie lost an 11-inning pitching duel to Whitehill of the Tigers, 1 to 0.

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FLYNN AGREES TO DATE NAMED FOR BIG BATTLE

Meet Has Been Hanging Fire For Over Year

NEW YORK, Aug. 22—Leo P. Flynn, manager of Dave Shade, sent telegrams yesterday to the Boxing Commission and to Tex Rickard accepting September 21 as the date for the Walker-Shade battle for the welterweight championship of the world, which is to be staged at the Yankee Stadium. On Tuesday the commission received a wire from Flynn demanding Walker's forfeit of \$10,000, but at that time Leo was apparently not aware of the fact that the welterweight king had signed for the match.

SET FOR SEPTEMBER 21

On receipt of the wire from Flynn yesterday Rickard wired back that everything was set for the Yankee Stadium on September 21 and that he would wait Leo's arrival here for the signing of the official articles. These papers have already been signed for Walker by his manager, Jack Kearns. The telegram from Flynn yesterday virtually closes a match that has been on the fire for more than a year. It was the Boxing Commission of this state that forced the issue in this division, as it has been trying to force the issue in the heavyweight class between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills. Walker apparently had no desire to mix with Shade and took advantage of every subterfuge to side-step the match. The fact that Shade stopped the formidable Jimmy Slattery at the Polo Grounds did not tend to increase Mickey's interest in the proposed scuffle.
