TRAIL RIDERS UNVEIL MONUMENT TO TOM WILSON—EARLIEST GUIDE

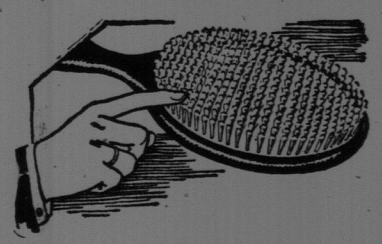

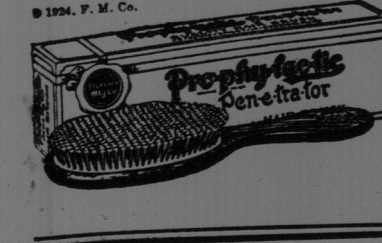

of that solemn chamber where so many human dramas have been enacted, and which has any woman ever been called upon to face a more merciless cross-examination than that to which the claimant, Mrs. Frances Mendham, was subjected by Sir Edward Marshall-Hall.

Question after question was raised upon the woman, whose slender fingers moved gracefully as they emphasized her answers—answers which at length resulted in the collapse of her case without the defendant being called upon to go into the witness box to deny any promise of marriage, and which also resulted in the Lord Chief Justice, after entering judgment for the defendant with costs, saying: "I shall now consider whether this is not a case where I shall send the papers to the public prosecutor."

Her statements. Mrs. Mendham alleged that M. Robert LeBaudy, brother of Jacques LeBaudy, self-styled "Emperor of the Sahara," who died a tragic death at the hands of his wife in 1919, and son of Jules LeBaudy, "sugar king," who left some thirteen million pounds to be distributed among his heirs, had asked her to marry him. She said her maiden name was Cartwright, and that she was born at Madison, in New York State, in 1899. When she was only 18 years of age she met a youngster named Robert Curtis, with whom she fell in love. She was very unhappy and left her husband, and was adopted by Maurice Mendham, a wealthy friend of the family and a business friend of her father. This was with her parents' consent, she said. In 1909 she divorced her youthful husband. Later on she was married to Mr. Mendham, her guardian, and lived with him till his death.

The next two years she was traveling backwards and forwards between Europe and America, and on one of these journeys she met M. LeBaudy. He appeared to be very interested and told her he would very much like to help her in her singing career. They met frequently after that, alleged Mr. Mendham. In 1918, she told him that she must return to America to deal with the legal affairs concerning her husband's estate, whereupon, she alleged, M. LeBaudy begged her not to go away, and suggested that if she would give up her claims to the estate and give up all thought of her career he would marry her.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH REPORT

New York, Aug. 8.—(United Press)—The annual report of the congregational churches of the United States has just been made public. A summary made by Rev. Charles E. Burton, the secretary, shows a notable tendency towards fewer churches but better. The denomination reports a loss of 110 churches, but an increase of 3,322 members. The average membership per church, taking the country over, increased from 147 to over 160. This is accounted for by three reasons: First, the concentration of population in cities from the country thus making the continuance of rural churches impossible. Second, the wide use of the automobile allows many country dwellers to go to the town church. Third, the growing spirit of church union or federation which brings about the union of two or more small churches of various denominations into one strong church.

the churches amount to \$18,343,948, being an increase of \$24,350 in the year. The annual budgets of the churches reporting amount to \$18,261,691, which is \$1,479,938 more than the preceding year. This does not include the benevolences of the churches, which total \$8,368,181, or \$163,965 more than the preceding year.

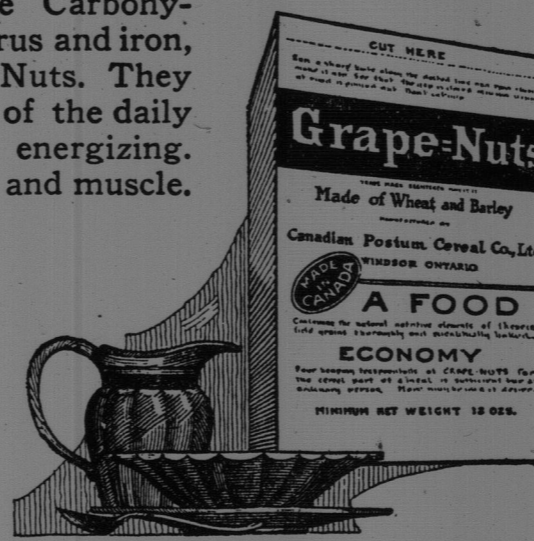

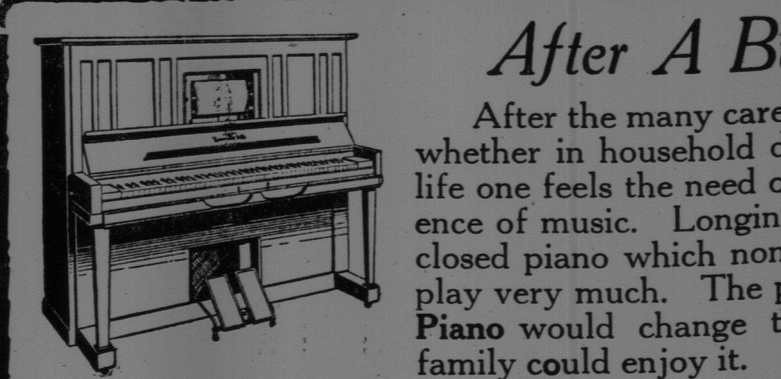
