

POWER COMPANY VS. CITY GOES OVER TILL SEPTEMBER 25

The injunction case of the New Brunswick Power Company vs. the City of St. John has been postponed until Tuesday, Sept. 25, at 10:30 a. m. When it will again be taken up by Mr. Justice White. F. R. Taylor, K. C., counsel for the plaintiff, intimated yesterday afternoon that he would bring witnesses from Toronto to rebut the evidence given by the Toronto witnesses for the defence as well as a witness from Montreal. Dr. Baxter suggested that the Power Company allow the city to place the safeguards mentioned where interference occurred, but Dr. Taylor would not agree to this course.

As an adjournment until after the Appeal Court session would mean practically a month's delay, he would ask Mr. Taylor if the witness from Montreal could add anything to what had already been said. Dr. Taylor said he could.

Dr. Baxter then called the attention of the Judge to the Act of 1922 where a municipality having a contract with the Provincial Commission was given power to construct a distribution system despite previous legislation, and this, he thought, modified at least the prohibition of interference contained in the former legislation and under it he contended that all the city was required to do was to use reasonable care not to unduly interfere with the company. He suggested that the company agree to let the city proceed with the distribution system and attach the safeguards mentioned in the testimony to their poles to carry the company wires. Dr. Taylor said the contention of the company was that the whole proceeding of the city was unlawful and they could not therefore agree to any such proposal.

His Honor then set Tuesday, Sept. 25, at 10:30 a. m. as the date on which the hearing would be resumed.

SOME C. N. R. TRAIN SERVICE CHANGES

Canadian National Railways announce that after Monday, September 3rd, Suburban trains 187 and 188 between Hampton and St. John will be discontinued. Trains Nos. 89 and 40, between Moncton and Cape Tormentine will be cancelled after Saturday, Sept. 8th. This means that P. E. E. connections will be made at Sackville after that date instead of Moncton. The Cafe Parlor Car will run to Moncton as usual on No. 14 train, but will return on No. 17, furnishing evening meal for passengers between Moncton and St. John. Sunday trains Nos. 49 and 50, between Moncton and St. John, will be continued until September 23rd. After Sept. 8th the extra first class car on No. 57 train for subordinates on the Valley Railway will be discontinued, and after Monday, Sept. 10th, No. 249 train between Fredericton and St. John will operate on regular schedule on Mondays.

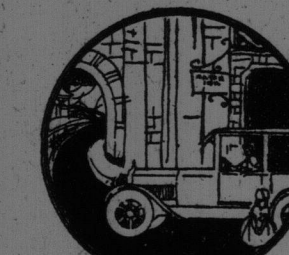

U. N. B. MEMORIAL HALL CONTRACT

The contract for the erection of the Memorial building at the University of New Brunswick was awarded yesterday to B. Mooney and Sons at a price in the vicinity of \$92,000. Work will be commenced on the structure at once and is to be completed on May 1, 1924. The building, of two-stories and basement, of brick with stone trimming and pitched roof. It has a depth of 114 feet, including the Memorial Hall, and a frontage of 112 feet. In addition to the Memorial Hall there will be chemistry and electrical classrooms and a complete kitchen and dining room equipment. Chancellor C. C. Jones said yesterday that about \$140,000 would be required for the building and the equipment and the amount that had been pledged to date was scarcely \$120,000. Of this amount \$80,000 had been secured from the public appeal, a response which had been encouraging in view of business conditions. The matter of securing the additional funds for the equipment was one that must receive serious consideration.
