**UNITED CHARITY FUND IS URGED**

Proposal to Centralize This Work Endorsed at Meeting of Halifax Citizens.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

A meeting of citizens, prominent in charitable work, was held at the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon to discuss the matter of an Associated Charity Fund, such as is being successfully worked out in other cities, notably London, Ontario, Winnipeg, Brantford, etc.

Mr. A. Handfield Whitman, representing the council of the Board of Trade, after having been approved of by the Board of Trade, stated the purpose of the meeting was to get an expression of opinion from those interested in the financial end of charitable work in the city. He had studied, to some extent, the method in vogue in Edinburgh, Scotland, where it had been carried on successfully for a number of years, and instead of the continuous collecting, a budget containing the requirements of all organizations and completed a total amount aimed at and one week is set aside for the canvass by the different clubs and organizations of the city.

Several outstanding features of the plan which commended themselves to all citizens are:

1. There is no duplication of effort on the part of those busy men who each give a part of their valuable time to the work of collecting the necessary funds for the carrying on of the city's welfare work.
2. There is no repetition of appeals through the year.
3. Expense in connection is reduced to a minimum—the cost of the united campaign being a little if any more than would be expended in the disunited campaign.
4. The existence of a budget committee composed of the city's most prominent men, whose integrity is unquestioned, provides assurance to the giver that no more money will be asked for than is actually required. Giving is thus centralized, systematic and made intelligent. Each subscriber to the fund knows that every dollar he subscribes will be carefully accounted for and expended to the best advantage; here unworked contributions will be carefully tended to.

The object of the united fund is to place the burden of caring for the orphaned children and aged poor, the homeless and crippled of the community on the shoulders of all the citizens at large, rather than the will of a few, and the splendid support given this work in other Canadian cities is almost a guarantee it can be successfully carried on in the city of Halifax.

A resolution was moved by C. C. Iackendar approving of the scheme, which was seconded by Alderman Ackert.

G. R. Hart moved that the fund be placed in a department of the Board of Trade, the same as it is in London, Ontario. This was seconded by J. C. Ross.

R. J. Murphy moved that a committee of citizens be named to work out preliminary, and later call a meeting of representatives of all the organizations to discuss the whole scheme, said initial committee to be named by the council of the Board of Trade. This was seconded by Mr. Woodbury. All the above resolutions unanimously carried.

weeks in this country. He received his thirteenth and fourteenth academic degrees from Georgetown University and Howard University respectively.

As the deliverer of Metz, where he received his education at the Jesuit College of St. Clement, the marshal was the recipient of a gold sword on the campus of Georgetown University. The sword, the gift of forty-one Jesuit educational institutions in this country, is chased in green, yellow and red, with an eagle surmounting the hilt. The presentation was made by the Very Rev. Joseph H. Rockwell of New York, Provincial of the Jesuit order.

After the presentation the Rev. John B. Creeden, S. J., President of Georgetown University, conferred upon Marshal Foch the degree of Doctor of Canon and Civil Laws. Attorney General Daugherty, James Davis, Secretary of Labor, and a large number of diplomatic representatives attended the ceremony, which concluded with a review of the Georgetown cadets. Marshal Foch then visited Howard University and received the degree of Doctor of Laws.

He attended a dinner and reception at the French embassy. Plans to visit Baltimore tomorrow have been canceled, and instead the Marshal may go to Annapolis to inspect the United States Naval Academy. He will visit Baltimore later on his American tour.

**MONCTON DOESN'T THANK MEIGHEN**

It's Prosperity Began in H. R. Emmerson's Time—Railroad Facts Worth Remembering.

(Moncton Transcript.)

There is a banner stretching across Main street, bearing the humorous inscription "Meighen and a Greater Moncton." There is many a broad smile as pedestrians pass along for no reason other than the joke. Of course, Moncton owes its prosperity to Mr. Meighen, our central location, the ambition, industry and enterprise of our citizens, and our natural gas have nothing to do with it. We must owe our success to Mr. Meighen and his railway policy.

Moncton had a steady growth prior to 1866, but shortly after that time it had a boost which was the beginning of a rapid growth. Our fine railway station, which had been promised for many years became an actual fact after the beginning of the Liberal regime. Our large new shops are part of the I. C. R. policy of extension when Hon. Mr. Emmerson was Western Canada's representative and the minister of railways. The double tracking of the railway and the improvements of the roadbed, the fine heavy engines, the modern rolling stock and the inauguration of up-to-date railway service belong to the Liberal regime; Moncton always stood to gain by these improvements. But things changed in 1911. From that time our railway has been neglected, our leading officials have been moved to Toronto, and with the removal of authority to the west, the maritime provinces have been denied any right in the management of our railways.

It was Mr. Meighen's government who purchased a junk railway which made millions of a few of his friends. Why did he not even then maintain the Intercolonial as a unit, so that it could hold the property which it had built up. Instead of that the I. C. R. was linked up with the C. N. R. and its splendid equipment, its engines, freight cars, passenger cars, sleepers and diners were distributed over the west. Of course, we received cars in exchange, but look at the dilapidated things that are passing over our railways. The diners that came here and had to be equipped with silverware and table linen and the sleepers had to be refurbished, and the broken-down freight cars repaired at the Intercolonial expense.

No wonder there is a deficit of one seventy million dollars, but the Hon. F. B. Carroll states that it was found to be much more than that when matters were looked into, and any person who has had accounts against the C. N. R. can readily believe that there is some reason why the same remain so long unpaid.

**PRAYER FOR THE PEACE OF THE WORLD**

The following call to serious study and earnest prayer was prepared at the request of the annual meeting of the General Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the Methodist Church—To the Ministers and Adherents of the Methodist Church:

The world stands again at the parting of the ways. The invitation of the President of the United States to the great powers to join in conference on the problems of world peace brings home to all of us the critical nature of international relations. The great war has left the world still bleeding through every pore. Manhood is still being trained on a wholesale scale for war. Material resources are still being diverted from the arts of peace to the work of mutual destruction. Armies and navies still impose ponderous burdens of taxation on peoples already staggering under the costs of the war. Energies of mind and heart, urgently needed to solve the problems of world re-organization, are still being diverted into channels developing suspicions between nations. The situation is intolerable, and will compel speedy determination either by explosion in war or by resolution into constructive discussion.

At this time the Church of Christ finds itself under special obligation to liberate the pent up spiritual energies of the human heart reinforcing them by intense communion with God. The minds of statesmen, who have been obsessed with the routines of international relations, will be refreshed and fortified by a mighty spiritual movement among the peoples. Our task, as the organized representatives of Jesus Christ, is to ensure that this needed element is not lacking.

The world now demands the limitation and speedy reduction of armaments as the guarantee of actual peace, formed by the statement of the loving people, that the intricate and insistent problems now threatening peace are in process of peaceful solution.

We therefore invite our ministers and people during the continuance of the conference to consecrate to the promotion of world peace every agency and opportunity of prayer and discussion.
