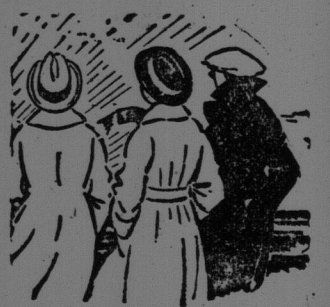

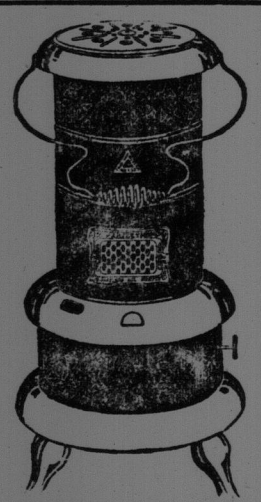

DIED ON VOYAGE TO THE DOMINION

Two Passengers on the Caronia—Ship Arrived at Halifax Today.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 29.—The Cunard liner Caronia, in today from Southampton, encountered stormy weather on virtually the entire trip. On December 28 Vinvald Skalks, a third class passenger, died on Christmas day Anna Schults, also in the steerage, passed away.

During the voyage concerts in aid of the Seamen's Institute were held, these netting a total of \$89. The steamer has 2,147 passengers, of which number 270 are disembarking at Halifax, the others remaining on board for New York, for which port the Caronia will sail this afternoon.

WILL BE USED AS HOTEL AGAIN

FORECLOSURE ON CLARK, UNDER DEATH SENTENCE

Man Who is Condemned for Phoebe Bell Murder

More Applicants for Retail Liquor Vendorships—New Fisheries Company, \$100,000 Capital—N. B. Business Notes.

Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 29.—The Royal Gazette contains notice of the foreclosing of a mortgage on Newman C. Clark, who is now in Victoria county jail sentenced to be hanged on March 1 for the murder of Phoebe Bell at Grand Falls.

William Mason and John A. Bourque, doing business in the city of Moncton as the Victoria Garage, have made an assignment for the benefit of their creditors to I. Newton Killam, high sheriff of Westmorland.

A large fisheries company has been incorporated in New Brunswick for the purpose of pursuing fisheries along the coast of Charlotte county and elsewhere and carrying on all the branches of fishing and the preparation of its by-products. The new company will have its chief place of business at St. George, and is capitalized at \$125,000. Those incorporated are: E. C. R. Todd of Milltown, C. Belyea of St. John, George E. Frauley and James H. Frauley of St. George, and St. John C. E. Le. of St. John. The McPhail Hardware Co., Ltd., also is incorporated in this province, with head office at Perth, and capital stock of \$2,000. This company is to carry on business as general merchants and wholesale and retail dealers in hardware.

RING CASE IN COURT AGAIN

In the police court today Max Williams, charged with unlawfully detaining and refusing to deliver to William L. Wright, a certain diamond and pearl stick-pin, valued at \$1,000, which, it was said, he had received in pawn from W. L. Wright, and for which it was said principal and interest had been tendered, pleaded not guilty and a postponement was granted at the request of the defence until Wednesday, January 3. Isaac Williams, father of the accused, was acquitted on a similar charge several months ago as it was shown that he was not a pawn-broker. The accused was allowed his liberty by giving bail for \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each. J. Starr Tait conducted the prosecution and Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., the defence.

Cecil Livingstone, aged twenty-four, was arrested last night by Sergeant Spinney and Policeman Campbell, on suspicion of stealing a suit of clothes, a flashlight and discharge papers, valued at \$80, the property of Erskine A. Mann, and also with stealing a suit-case, valued at \$4, the property of Daniel Dunphy. He was remanded until this afternoon when the preliminary examination was commenced.

Mrs. Dora Harrowitz, charged with having liquor in her premises unlawfully forfeited a deposit of \$50.

A case against Augustus Waters, charged with obtaining money under false pretences was resumed but again postponed until Wednesday morning, January 3. Messrs. Kelly and Ross represented the Colonial Hide Company, from whom the accused is alleged to have obtained the money, and J. A. Barry appeared for the accused.

TRAFFIC CASE.

A by-law case in which James Collins was charged with exceeding the speed limit in Union street on December 22, was heard in the police court this morning. He said he did not remember the incident but Policeman MacNeil said he was going at the rate of twenty miles an hour. The magistrate said, "you would be excused if you had run down some of those 'little darlings' that parade in Union street from Waterloo to Charlotte street." He was fined \$10.

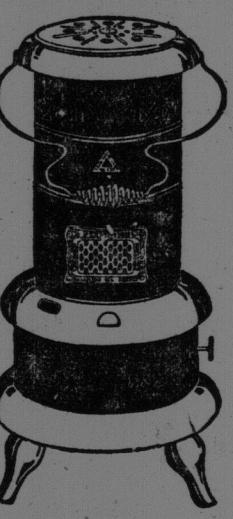

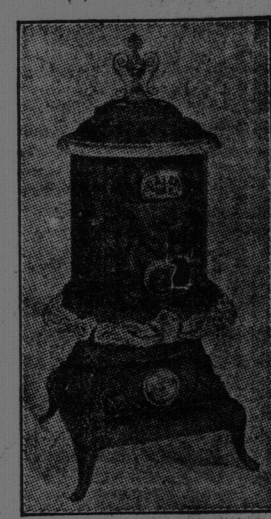
