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HEAT RATIONS IN ENGLAND; COAL SCARCITY

Sugar and Liquor Carefully Doled Out Also — Few Cases of Drunkenness — Much Interest in Races

(Correspondence of Toronto Mail and Empire.)

Liverpool, Nov. 10.—Canadians traveling abroad for the first time are prone to discuss whether they should take along dinner jackets or evening dress. At this time of year all such debates are frivolous. What they should consider is whether they ought to equip themselves with fleece-lined underwear or cosquin coats, and if they have room they ought to compromise by taking both. After being in Liverpool for a few days one understands how Englishmen in Canada can do without overcoats for the first two or three winters. The cold here is of that peculiar quality of the Far West—you don't feel it after you have become thoroughly numbed. The snow is also of an unusual quality. It varies in color from grey to khaki, and there is reason to believe it has aniline dyes that would be valuable could they be extracted.

On Heat Rations.

Where we are staying is supposed to be the warmest place in England, if not in Western Europe. It is about as warm as looking at the hockey ballistics on Bay street. There is a fuel shortage all over England. Coal is rationed. Householders and hotel proprietors, too, are given a certain allowance of coal or gas. They may take their units either in heat or in light. If they look enough gas to illuminate their home as well as a Toronto home is lighted they would probably be without heat altogether, and if they took enough fuel they would have to go to bed about 5.30. On this account the streets are poorly lighted, and in the suburbs it is as dark as on a country road. Yet there is no complaining on the part of people who have suffered this particular form of discomfort in varying degrees for five years.

English Women and War.

We have done nothing but knit and write letters of condolence for five years. A Liverpool lady last evening. All their young friends are gone. Though they are quite placid and cheerful on the surface, you get the idea that something has broken in their hearts, that this period is a mere between-acts for them, and that when the curtain rises again the background will be the Everlasting Hills. The war came close to Liverpool. German submarines made their way up the Mersey, having gone round the north of Scotland, and there were spotted by aircraft and trapped or holed. They have lived in the shadows so long that a little deepening of the little lessening makes small difference.

Peace Rationing.

Apart from coal, there is not apparent any general shortage of supplies, except sugar. Without asking the waiter, a hotel guest can secure about a third of what he wants. The result of asking is that you can get half what you want. Liquor is rationed, and there seems to be a general belief that the government is never likely wholly to relinquish its war-time grip upon the traffic. One of the largest lounge rooms in Liverpool is restricted to two bottles a day.

"Do you mean two for each guest?" enquired Mr. Christie.

Spirits are probably not more than as high in alcoholic content as before the war, but imported wines seem to be about the same.

Drink and Sport.

The bars and the liquor shops open at noon for a couple of hours, and again from 6 p. m. to 10. One sees queues standing in the streets for the signal to be given. The thrifting file in one direction and the other. Two of the species grow wild in England, but their flowers are green and rather unattractive. Others have been introduced from western Asia have whitish flowers, but by far the best of all is Helleborus niger, the famous Christmas rose. Several hybrids and varieties have been produced by gardeners, but without much success. The old favorite still reigns supreme. The purest white flowers, free from the spots produced by the rain and frosts, can be produced by putting over the clumps small glass frames. They must be supported a few inches

from the ground to allow free circulation of air, and when the weather is fine and the frames removed, the Christmas rose can be seen in all its glory with perfect snowy petals and rings of glaucous leaves.
