MRS. WILLIAM CARLETON DEAD.
Otherwise Stock Market Opening Today Was Generally Firm

A lady very highly esteemed through long life passed to her rest this morning when death came to Mrs. William Carleton, at her home, 83 Paddock street. She was in her eighty-first year, and was the widow of William Carleton, who died in April, 1915, and who had been employed in the customs service since before the confederation of the provinces.

Mrs. Carleton was the mother of Judge John L. Carleton; William Carleton, prominent in theatrical life and for many years with Kellar and Elanor of New York; Rev. C. P. Carleton of Silver Falls, and Mrs. John Connor. William Carleton arrived from New York and Mr. Connor from Boston before she passed away.

Mrs. Carleton was an O'Connor of Albert county, but had lived in St. John for more than sixty years. She was a woman of fine character, greatly devoted to her home and family, and of the most kindly and charitable instincts. She and her husband are held in kind remembrance by citizens of the older generation, and a very wide circle of friends will extend sympathy to the bereaved family. The funeral will take place from her late residence on Saturday morning.

FOGH EXPRESSES THANKS TO BRITISH PEOPLE FOR RECEPTION

Speaks of Unity on Field Which Made it Possible to "Whack" Common Enemy

London, Dec. 4.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuter's, Limited)—Marshal Foch, in a message issued through Reuter's agency on the eve of his departure from London, expresses to the British public how happy, touched, grateful and proud he feels in view of the unforgettable reception he has been given in London.

"That reception was the exact reflection of the sincere and intimately close union which has animated us on the field of honor and which has enabled us together to whack our common enemy and which will continue to bind us one to the other," the marshal continued. "I fully reciprocate the sentiments which I have had expressed to me here, and I am happy and proud at having inspired them."

REPORTED THAT HINDENBURG IS TO BE ARRESTED

Copenhagen, Dec. 4.—The soldiers' and workmen's council at Leipzig has decided that German general headquarters shall be dissolved and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg arrested, according to the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin.

PRESENTATION MADE TO MAJOR H. GRAHAM STARR

Gift of Morocco Traveling Bag on Leaving for Post in Military District No. 2

Major H. Graham Starr, A.P.M., M.D., No. 7, is to leave tonight to take up his new duties as A.P.M. with M. D. No. 2. Major Starr came to St. John as A.F. M., M.D., No. 7 in last July and since that time has been a very popular officer in this district. During his term of office here as A.P.M. this branch of the service has been increased and has shown a high standard of efficiency, due to the interest and strenuous work displayed by Major Starr.

This morning at the armories Major Starr was made the recipient of a handsome Morocco traveling bag with fittings by the members of the staff and force of the C.M.P.C. The following letter accompanied the presentation, which was made by Sergt-Major Rayner:

St. John, N. B., Dec. 4, 1918.
Major H. Graham Starr, Assistant Provost Marshal, Military District No. 7, St. John, N. B.
Dear Sir:

It is with deep regret that we, the members of No. 7 Detachment C.M.P.C. have learned of your departure to larger fields of work, and ask that you accept this small token of gratitude for your efforts in establishing this detachment of the Canadian Military Police Corps. While we regret your loss, we wish to extend to you every good wish for the future.

In reply Major Starr expressed his regret at leaving M.D. No. 7, and although he was going to a larger district, he would always bear in mind the fellowship shown towards him in this district. He closed the presentation, which was accepted by Major Starr with success to M.D. No. 7.

Three hearty cheers and a tiger were tendered Major Starr at the close of the presentation.

SHIPPINGS AND MOTORS WERE OFF

Otherwise Stock Market Opening Today Was Generally Firm

New York, Dec. 4.—Shipping and motors were conspicuous exceptions to the general firmness prevailing at the opening of today's stock market. Marine Preferred and Studebaker losing two points each. These declines were neutralized by gains of one to four points in oils. United States Rubber, American Canadian Woolen, Beet Sugar, International Nickel, United Cigar Stores and Distillers. United States Steel made a substantial fractional gain, but rails were listless and without material change. Liberty fourth 4 1/2's fell to a new level, selling at 96 1/2.

Recovery.

New York, Dec. 4.—Shippings soon recovered their losses but Studebaker remained heavy despite the strength of minor motors and accessories. Steels and coppers rose one to two points, with General Electric, but other popular industrials and equipments continued dull with rails. At midday United States Steel reached abruptly and Mexican Petroleum forfeited its two point rise, while Marine preferred showed an extreme rally of four points. Persistent selling of Liberty fourth 4 1/2's down to the new minimum of 96.22 was the feature of the bond market.

ONE KILLED, TWO HURT IN BUILDING WORK NEAR HALIFAX

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 4.—Aurelien Picard, of Bordeaux, Montreal, was instantly killed, and Louis Pitre of Barrachoie, P. Q., seriously injured yesterday when a girder being used in the construction of a building at the United States naval air station at Eastern Passage, near this city, and on which the men were working, collapsed. A third man was injured slightly.

SUGAR RESTRICTIONS ON AMERICAN HOMES ARE ALL REMOVED

Washington, Dec. 4.—Restrictions on the purchase of sugar for consumption in homes and public eating places were removed last night by the food administration, because of an expected increase from Cuba as well as an increase in the supply of Louisiana cane and western beet sugar.

CORN AND OATS HAD HIGHER RANGE TODAY.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—Corn averaged higher in price today owing more to scarcity of offerings than to any urgent buying. Temporary setbacks, however, resulted from reports that England and France had been given a credit of \$240,000,000 in Argentina with which to acquire grain. Discontinuance of the car permit system had also a transient bearish effect. Opening prices which ranged from the same as yesterday's finish to 1 1/2 cents higher, with January at \$1.30 1/2 and February at \$1.30 5/8 to \$1.31 1/2, were followed by reactions, but then by new upturns.

Oats' hardened with corn. After opening unchanged to 3-8 cents higher, with January at 72 1/2 to 72 5/8 cents, the market sagged and then rose again. Strength in the hog market and in corn lifted provisions.

ST. JOHN SOLDIERS REACH VLADIVOSTOK.

Word of the safe arrival of Sergt. G. (Harry) MacDonald and Sergt. Irvine on Oct. 30 at Vladivostok, Siberia, has been received in the city. Both young soldiers were recently attached to No. 7 C. S.
