HIGHER PRICES FOR CROWN LANDS

Fredericton, Aug. 1.—Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines, yesterday and today was in conference with Deputy Minister T. G. Loggie concerning the matter of upset prices for the 400 square miles of crown land timber limits, the licenses of which expire today. The minister announced this morning that upset prices had been set for all the limits. It is understood that there is an upward trend in the prices compared with what has been received by the crown lands department in past years.

RAILS LOWER TODAY.

New York, Aug. 1.—(Wall Street)—Rails were fractionally lower at the regular opening of today's stock market. Baltimore & Ohio and Washish issues showing especial heaviness on postponement of dividend action. Marine preferred and United Fruit reacted fractionally to a point with Mexican Petroleum and Crucible Steel. Sumatra Tobacco was the chief element of strength, gaining two and a half points. U. S. Steel common and preferred made slight gains and California Petroleum preferred and Atlantic Gulf displayed firmness. Price movements became more uneven before the end of the first half hour on pressure against investment rails. Liberty bonds were steady.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF INDIAN WOMAN NEAR OROMOCTO

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 1.—The body of an Indian woman from the Burton Reservation was found on the banks of the St. John River below Oromocto this morning. The woman, who is twenty-five years of age, was apparently in good health and spirits when last seen Wednesday evening. An investigation regarding circumstances surrounding her death is being conducted today by the officials.

BANK OF ENGLAND WEEKLY STATEMENT

London, Aug. 1.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserves decreased £1,006,000; circulation increased £1,127,000; bullion increased £121,515; other securities increased £3,467,000; public deposits increased £3,114,000; other deposits increased £1,742,000; notes reserve decreased £1,054,000; securities increased £2,388,000.

NEED MILLION WORKERS FOR WAR INDUSTRIES

Washington, Aug. 1.—A shortage of 600,000 unskilled workers in war industries is shown in incomplete reports to the department of labor federal employment bureau, which today took over the recruiting of this class of labor for war industries employing a maximum force of 1,000,000 or more. Final reports, it was announced, are expected to show a shortage of 1,000,000 workers.

Rousing Welcome Awaits Dr. Beland

Quebec, Aug. 1.—Dr. Beland, after four years' captivity in Germany, and who is returning home, is expected to arrive in his home in Beauce some time this week-end. He will travel over the Quebec Central on the private car of General Manager Walsh, with his daughter, who was held in Belgium since the opening of the war. Every small town all along the route of the train bearing Dr. Beland is organizing receptions to the liberated captive of Germany, and the entire region of Beauce is feverish with the organizing of a monster reception that will welcome home the valiant member for Beauce. A mass meeting will be held at St. Joseph's Beauce on Sunday evening and Dr. Beland will address his electors. Keen interest is manifested in the doctor's expected statements, especially on his prospective state of suffering and imprisonment at the hands of the Germans.

MUST BUY SUBSTITUTES

Of late W. S. Foster, provincial food board inspector, has received many complaints from local grocers to the effect that some grocers in the city are selling flour without substitutes. The law demands that for every four pounds of flour sold the purchaser must buy at least one pound of substitutes. As the grocers are violating this act is the cancellation of the grocer's license, in addition to a fine of from \$100 to \$1,000. Mr. Foster wants to know the grocers before he takes any action. Substitutes include potatoes, rice, cornmeal and practically all lines of foodstuffs.

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A "CLOSE-UP" OF OUR FIGHTING MEN IN FRANCE

(Continued from page 1) In that way—for having lived the better where there is no enemy to think of. And, surprising as it may be to his friends back in Canada, the trench life, not the back areas, is the ideal.

It is to catch his life in the daily round of camp, to picture him as he is during so much of his career hitherto neglected in publicity, to let his friends see him away from the cable reports of thundering action, that is my ambition. If I can paint him as a Canadian always—a lad who plays while he may with penmanship for the joys of life, who fights while he must with a heart that smoothes out so many of the perils, who comes back from the front lines with the same old eagerness for the joys of life, who sticks to the soil of a foreign land only until this ugly affair is over—I may be able to satisfy his friends back home, as I have long known, that all France is not the firing-step, and that their valour soldier-boy, returning to them penniless and with a broken back, is not the result of the tricolor the fervor of life, the sweetness of companionship, or that overwhelming Canadianism which put him in khaki.

SCAB THREATENS WHEAT IN THIS PROVINCE

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 1.—The department of agriculture for New Brunswick has received notice that the Grange is making its appearance in the wheat fields. A very large acreage in the province has been sown to wheat and indications point to a big yield. The appearance of the disease has caused anxiety and action on the part of the department is being taken to stamp it out. Experts are being employed to provide methods to combat this fungus growth.

ANOTHER WRIT OF HABEUS CORPUS

Quebec, Aug. 1.—Claiming that the supreme court has no jurisdiction in the matter of cases for habeas corpus, F. Choquette, advocate, son of Senator Choquette, took a writ of habeas corpus today here on behalf of J. B. Desilets, of a rural centre in the district of Quebec, who claims he has been drafted illegally.
