INDUCTION

Rev. F. G. McIntosh, formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church at Economy, Five Islands, N. B., was inducted as pastor of the church in St. John's last evening. Rev. Gordon Dickie of this city presided, and inducted the new minister, Rev. A. McIntosh of Sussex, addressed the minister, and Rev. J. King of Buctouche, addressed the people. There was a large congregation present.

TWO MEN'S WORK

It is not many years ago since Black's Harbor was the home of only a few fishermen, today it is the centre of a hive of industries, and the home of a vast number of industrious people, all of which may be traced to the business sagacity and energy of two men—Lewis and Patrick Connors—whose firm name of Connors Brothers has more than a continental reputation.

They began in a small way, did these two plain fishermen, and as their products were well put up, they soon found a ready market, and by degrees a great fish industry was established.

While their leading line is sardines, they are also big packers of other lines of sea products, such as clams, lobsters, scallops, finnan haddies, and the larger herrings. Their factory is one of the best equipped and most convenient on the continent.

Quite recently, they have launched out into other enterprises, and they are meeting with the same degree of success that they have attained in their fish industry.

They control the Maritime Steamship Company, whose boat, the "Connors Bros." makes weekly trips to this port as well as to St. George, St. John and other bay points. About all the product of the fish industry is sent by them to the railway in a new steamer.

Within a few weeks a large sawmill has been set in operation, a concrete dam enclosing enough water to keep the mill running six months. Bax shooks are the chief manufacture, but other lines of lumber are also manufactured.

All the latest labor-saving and money-saving devices have been placed in this mill. The fuel by which the mill is operated is composed of sawdust, which is specially treated, making an excellent combustible.

But interesting as these other lines of

business are, the greatest interest centres around their fish farm. There are 69 boxes on this farm, some of them black, some blue, and some just plain fox. One pair of black foxes the company recently sold for \$10,000, and they have two other pairs that they value at \$80,000. A valuable consignment recently arrived from Prince Albert, Sask. There are five raccoons attached to the farm, occupying donkeys of the own. The keeper, a Scotchman, named Campbell, enjoys the confidence of the animals to wonderful degree, and they readily respond to his call, particularly when he has something tasty to tempt their appetites with. The animals are fed chiefly on soda crackers and fish, being given their rations frequently and in small quantities.

VITAL MATTER FOR FORESTERS AT HIGH COURT

The high chief ranger said: "There has been much activity among many subordinate and companion courts in different parts of the province during the last two years, and where that activity has prevailed there has been a marked increase in membership although that increase has, to a very great extent, been offset by a decline in membership in other sections of this jurisdiction and in point of membership in this province at the close of my term of office the increase in our numbers is so slight that I must express my disappointment at the results."

How About Old Members

The high chief ranger devoted attention to the fact that at the supreme court meeting in 1911 a change was made in constitution whereby future contracts between the society and its members would provide for payment in cash at the age of seventy, of seven-tenths of the amount of the mortuary certificate, in lieu of old age annuity of 10 per cent after attaining that age.
