The Fredericton Gleaner says that seventy-five residents of the parish of New Maryland have agreed to co-operate with the board of trade and city council, and are ready to give one day or more with teams towards the improvement of the roads through that parish, leading from the city. Arrange-ments are to be made to carry out this programme, and the use of the city's stone crusher is to be granted for the days to be devoted to road repair.
