We have lost a young Minister, who could not live upon the small income of a Primitive Methodist Minister, and therefore has gone elsewhere!

The important grant from the English Missionary Society has enabled us to assist our young and struggling Missions, which otherwise could not subsist. The genuine results arising from the labours of our Missionaries on those Stations cannot be fully known until the Saviour gathers His people into the "rest which remains for the people of God."
