BRITAIN'S HOME TRADE.

Great as is the export trade of Great Britain, it is small indeed when compared with the home trade of the United Kingdom. Premier Asquith, in a recent speech, showed the latter to be almost ten times as great as that of the former, the figures for the last fiscal year being: Export trade, £426,2945,960. In one industry alone—shoes and leather—the value of exports was £2,000,000, while the home consumption was valued at £45,000,000. The effect of this is seen in the wage bills in the two departments of trade.
