THE REMOVAL OF GARBAGE. Interesting reports of the City Engineer in connection with refuse from gardens and

laining that their garbage barrels have teams engaged for that purpose by the city. A week or two ago a citizen having holiday decided that he would clean up his yard. His garbage barrel was almos full and in order to have his place look well he gathered up a few shovels full of rubbage and never thinking that it would rubbage and never thinking that it would not be removed, placed his barrel on the street. To his surprise the next morning he found part of the barrel had been dumped on the street in front of his premises, and he was obliged to sweep the same up or have an untidy sidewalk and gutter in front of his house.


