## SPORTING NEWS.

Dalhousie Defeats Acadia 7 to 0. WOLFVILLE, N. S., Nov. 4.—Dalhousie defeated Acadia at football here today, by score of 7 to 0. It was one of the first games that has been played on the college campus for some years.

Dalhousie won the toss. The first half was a series of scrimmages with ball near the centre, except in first five minutes when it was dangerously near Acadia's line. The forwards were evenly matched. Score in first half was 0 to 0.

In second half Acadia kicked the ball into Dalhousie's territory and their full back muffed and Acadia by a dribble forced the visitors to touch for safety. Ball then remained for a time near the centre, while Acadia's half prevented Acadia from making ground. Near the end of the second half Dalhousie forced the ball into Acadia's territory, but Acadia prevented her opponents. Then Dalhousie kicked a goal from Acadia's 25 yard line and score was 4 to 0.

After the face off Acadia had the advantage until the last minute of play when Dalhousie, after a long dribble, made a try which failed to convert into a goal. Score 7 to 0 in favor of Dalhousie.

The St. Joseph's team passed through the try yesterday afternoon on their way to Fredericton, where they will play the U. N. boys today. The team is in charge of Mr.weeney, a St. John boy, and they are a body looking lot of lads, although not over even to weight.

## OTTAWA NEWS.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—A report has been received from Supt. Constantine, who has established a Mounted Police post at Fort MacPherson in Delta, Saskatchewan on the Arctic. The primary object in establishing a post at this point is to assert Canadian authority over the Arctic region, to prevent lawlessness and the debauching of Eskimo and Indians by American whalers.

For many years United States whalers have been frequenting Arctic seas, and have made Canadian islands their winter quarters. On news being received by them that the police were coming, they have moved some three hundred miles further east, in the direction of Cape Bathurst. It is felt that eventually the Canadian government will have to place gunboats in these waters.

The name of C. W. Spencer, master of transportation of the C. P. R. Western line, is again being mentioned by the chairmanship of the railway commission.

Henri M. Ami of the geological survey, left this morning for the maritime provinces, where he will spend two weeks making geological observations.

The maritime list of cases in the supreme court will not be taken up before Dec. 1st.

D.'s were charged by Mr. Jones with neglecting to report births. Mr. Currey asked for an adjournment that he might carefully go into the charges.

Mr. Jones had no objection to an adjournment, and the magistrate named Wednesday next, at 2.30 o'clock, for the hearing of the case.

## SALVATION ARMY.

At the Salvation Army barracks Charlotte street, last evening, special addresses were delivered by Ensign MacKenzie on "Survival," Staff Capt. McLean, on "The Need of the Hour," and Mrs. Col. Sharpe on "Overcomers." The attendance was large and special music was furnished.

Tonight a special service will be held, when the different phases of army work will be presented, representing the army in its first stages and the army as it is today. The first will be under the direction of Ensign McElhenry, while Major Howell will have command of the latter.

Staff Capt. Holman will give an insight into the social work of the army. There will also be a representation of the trades and labor union.

Col. Sharpe arrived home last evening from New York, where he has been attending the funeral of Mrs. Booth-Tucker. The colonel states that the funeral was attended by thousands and evidences of great grief were seen on every side. Col. Sharpe was anxious to see Eva Booth, the Canadian commissioner, but was unable to, owing to her illness, brought on by grief for her deceased sister. She is still ill in New York. While in the metropolis Col. Sharpe was very busy transacting business with the head officials in regard to army work. Today he takes two sessions with the officers, who are here attending the Army Council.

MONCTON NEWS. MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 4.—Rev. David Coburn was married in the Presbyterian church at Dorchester yesterday to Miss Kirk, daughter of Wm. Kirk of the maritime penitentiary.

A delegation representative of the carpenters and car repairers of Halifax, consisting of Messrs. Murray and Perrie, arrived here this morning for the purpose of having a consultation with General Manager Pottinger in regard to betterment of wage schedules. The Moncton delegates are Messrs. F. Gardiner, Alex. Barnard, Milton Cove, Joe Weldon and Mr. Legere.

The prolonged dry spell is reported to be having a rather serious effect in northern New Brunswick and sections of Quebec. The soil is so hard that farmers have been obliged to suspend fall ploughing and in many places there is a shortage of water for stock.

## SIX KILLED.

IONA ISLAND, N. J., Nov. 4.—Six men were killed and ten slightly injured this afternoon by an explosion at the U. S. naval arsenal at this place. One of the largest magazines in the United States. The explosion occurred while men were drawing the explosive charges from a consignment of old shells recently sent here from the battleship Massachusetts, and destroyed completely three massive shell houses, hurling a rain of fragments of projectiles of all sizes up to 13-inch shells in every direction.

The force of the explosion, or series of explosions, broke windows at Peekskill, three miles distant, on the opposite side of the Hudson, and the detonation was heard for many miles. Adjacent buildings, including two store-houses for fixed ammunition, were riddled with the fragments, and the quarters of the eleven men were completely demolished.

The dead, all of whom were workmen employed by the naval ordnance department, are: Fred Ward, Stony Point; Geo. Morehead, Tomkins Cove; Fred C. Locke, Peekskill; Patrick Curran, West Haverstraw; Fred Brown, Haverstraw; James Connelly, Peekskill.

The bodies were frightfully mangled, fragments being hurled in every direction for hundreds of feet.

Parnell looked for, so that it reflects credit alike upon the Fraser concern, the shippers and Nevill Cameron, the stowadore. Capt. Parnell will be welcomed by hosts of friends here if he should ever return to St. John.
