INTERESTING CLEWS IN WINTHROP MYSTERY

**Pawnbroker Found Who Sold Two Suit Cases,
and the Dismembered Parts are
Thought To Be In One.**

BOSTON, Sept. 27.—After a week of the most untiring and diligent investigation by the police departments of this city and of Winthrop the identity of the unknown woman, whose dismembered body was found in a dress suit case in the waters of Winthrop Bay remains unknown, and no positive clue to the perpetrator of the revolting crime has been discovered.

Considerable progress, however, has been made and the police feel assured that the number of articles found have a pertinent bearing on the crime and will lead to the ultimate apprehension of the culprit. Even if arrests were made, the police state, they must be able to positively identify the dead woman before the case could be prosecuted successfully. To this end they are bending their combined efforts.

In the belief that the head, arms and legs of the victim may have been cast into Winthrop Cove at the same time and near the same place as the dress suit case containing the torso, divers are now searching all the submarine territory of the bay. As yet their efforts have not been rewarded. Last the missing members had been deposited among ash or garbage receptacles at the head of the sanitary department has given instructions that everything be carefully scrutinized. While the police do not look for results from this avenue, they do not intend to neglect any possible channel.

The police attach the greatest importance to the discovery that two dress suit cases were purchased last week in a south end pawn broker's shop. The dress suit case in the possession of the state police has been identified by Joseph Berkman, the pawnbroker, as one that a stranger purchased. The authorities are of the opinion that the missing members of the woman's body were placed in the other dress suit case and disposed of in the same manner. Some, however, doubt that an ordinary dress suit case could hold the head and limbs.

Mr. Berkman has given the police a fairly good description of the purchaser of the dress suit case, but the probability is that the man has gone from the city and eluded the police.

The facts of the purchase of the dress suit case in the south end, and the wrapping paper, which was about a bundle of clothes found in Winthrop Bay, coming from No. 1 Dalton street, Back Bay district and to the possibility of the dead having been committed there. This is somewhat strengthened by the allegation that a man brought the larger dress suit case to be repaired by a harnessmaker near the store of Mrs. R. O. Dunham, at No. 2 Dalton street.

Company Has No Intention of
Using Other Ports.

Sir William Vanborne, in Important Interview Shatters the Hopes of Letang and Stockton, Me.

Today's St. Andrews' Beacon publishes an interesting interview with Sir William Vanborne regarding the C. P. R.'s plans with reference to St. John and rival ports on the Atlantic coast.

Asked as to whether there was anything in the report that the C. P. R. intended utilizing Letang as a port, Sir William wanted to know where that report was. He pool-pooled the idea that Letang would ever be used by the railway.

"There's nothing in the story," said he. "I'd be willing to bet one hundred dollars to one that there's nothing in it. Of course, I am not taking as active an interest in the railway as I once did, but I am quite sure that the Company has no such scheme on foot."

When asked as to whether any offer to purchase shore interests at Letang had been made to the Company's behalf, he replied that that story had probably been started by the man who had set the other report in motion.

"We are continually being pressed to use one port or another on the Atlantic. The port of Canning was one of the places that was urged upon our attention. It was represented as being an ideal port. But the C. P. R. has no intention of going into a Maine port."

"Not even into Stockton?" interjected the reporter.

"No," said Sir William. "St. John is capable of doing all the business that the road will do for some time to come. Though somewhat congested at present, there is room for considerable expansion. The railway is not eager to carry grain in the winter anyway. It would prefer to warehouse it and hold it until navigation on the St. Lawrence opens. You may not believe it, yet every ton of grain that is carried to St. John in the winter season by the C. P. R. is carried at a loss. We prefer to dump it as quickly as possible. A great deal of our western grain is dumped at Port Arthur and finds its way to New York. Very little comes east."

NO NEW MARSH ROAD MAIN THIS YEAR.

But Loch Lomond Water May
Come by Old Pipes.

Superintendent Murdoch Says He Can
Manage It and Give Better Pressure
Than Last Year.

A meeting of the Water and Sewerage Board was held yesterday afternoon. Ald. Frink, in the absence of the chairman, Mayor White, took the chair. Catch basins were asked for near Victoria Park, on Bridge street and near the Portland Rolling Mills.

The superintendent reported on the request of J. A. Corkery to have a water main run to his property, which he is dividing into lots for sale, the probable cost being \$3,400. Ald. Baxter moved that the repairs to the Carleton mains be attended to next year—Carried.

Dr. Stockton will be heard at the next meeting in regard to the exemption of Mrs. M. Morrisey on a Dock street property. The claim of Bustin & Porter in regard to damages suffered by Daniel McEdey by water in his cellar was heard.

Engineer Hunter's report of some three weeks ago on the water works was read. He spoke of the floating of the pipe in No. 1 section.

Some discussion followed in regard to who was to blame for this, and to whether the pipe had been tested. The contractors claimed that it was through no fault of theirs.

Ald. Pickett suggested that Mr. Hunter or Mr. Barbour be asked to submit a report to the council meeting on Monday. He thought this thing should be investigated and more information obtained, as the work was by far the most important the city had undertaken for some time.

Ald. Bullock moved as an amendment that a special meeting of the board be held near the last of the week to discuss the matter with Mr. Barbour or Mr. Hunter, and that a report be prepared. This was carried.

The superintendent said that it was not worth while digging the trench this fall, as there would be little trench left next spring.

A lady living on City Road was exempted from her property tax of 40 cents and her water tax of \$4. The woman is living in poverty and has been in the hospital for some time. The claim of the heirs of Richard Dooley was referred to the recorder.
