2. That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of Christ to be continued until his second coming, and that the former is requisite to be latter, that is to say, that those are to be admitted into the commusion of the Church, and to partake of all its ordinances and privileges, the upon profession of their faith have been baptized by Immersion, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Matt. wiii. 19, 20; 1 Cor. xi. 23-26; Acts ii. 41, 42, and ix. 18-26; and wii. 12, 36, 39; Matt. iii. 6-16; Rom. vi. 4; Col. iii. 12; Gal. iii. 27; and latt. xvi. 26-28; Acts xx. 11; 1 Cor. x. 16.

3. That since none but true believers can rightly partake of the Ordinaces, therefore the door of the church should be carefully kept against such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their union with Christ: Cor. xi. 27-29; Matt. vii. 6, 15-20; 1 Peter ii. 5.

4. That a Church thus gathered hath power to choose, and by Elders bordain those officers that Christ hath appointed in his Church, viz.: Shops or Elders, and Deacons; and also to depose such officers who make contrary to the rules of the Gospel; and to discipline their members, though in some such cases it may be convenient and profitable to whether the advice of neighbouring Churches of Christ: Acts i. 21-26, Elas iii. 10.

5. That a Bishop or Elder bath no more power to decide any case or introversy in the Church than any private brother; yet they, having inperior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the interest of the Church; and the Church ought to be subseted to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is ignored by the subset of the Church, and to administer the ordinances of the Gospel. and stote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebuking, and exhorts the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt. xx. 25-29; the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt. xx. 25-29; the That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to the the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church and improve affairs of the Church and the subset of the church and to the subset of the church and the subset of the subset of the church and the subset of th

That every believer is commanded to be faithful, to improve every and talent which is bestowed on him, in order to which, there ought be such a Gospel freedom that the Church may know where every uticular gift is, that it may be improved in its proper place, and to its the end, viz., the glory of God and the good of his people; and the burch ought to be subject to such improvements: 1 Peter iv. 10, 11, dv. 5; I Tim. iv. 14; 1 Cor. 12th and 14th chapters; Rom. xii. 3-8. & That there is a mutual obligation between Minister and peopleto administer in things religious and spiritual, according to the gifts od has given. The Church to communicate of their temporal or adly substance for his comfort and support, and that by an equality, nearly as can be ascertained, that one may not be burthened and anher eased. But this is not to be effected by force or compulsion, or the sword of civil power; but it is to be a free-will offering, agreeto the Scriptures of truth; and every member deficient in this matought to be disciplined by Gospel rule, as for any other breach of renant, or neglect of performing Christian duty: Luke x. 7; Rom.
