1918 SHIPBUILDING SHOWS LARGE TOTAL

Lloyds Annual Summary of
Mercantile Shipbuilding
Throughout World Shows
Output of 5,447,444 Tons

London, Thursday (British Wireless
Service).—Lloyds's annual summary of
mercantile shipbuilding throughout
the world in 1918 shows that the total
output of the Allied and neutral
countries for that year was
5,447,444 tons. This figure has never
previously been approached. It is
more than 62 per cent. higher than
the output of 1913, the record year
prior to the war, which included Ger-
many and Austria-Hungary, these
countries being excluded from the
present compilation.

Three hundred and one vessels of
1,348,120 tons, were launched in the
United Kingdom. This is 584,023 tons
below the record of 1913, but is 1,815,
224 tons more than in 1917 and 739,
886 tons more than in 1915.

Outside the United Kingdom there
were launched 1,568 merchant vessels,
of 14,009,224 tons. These figures show
an increase of 131 per cent. as com-
pared with 1917, and are 2,698,595 tons
higher than in 1913. The United
