Montreal, Oct. 20.— Hundreds of pounds of fish will be thrown away in Montreal this week, stated a local dealery day, on account of the inability of the middleman to get rid of their surplus stock. Vaet quantities of bullhead or barbot, as they are called by the French inhabitants, are clied by the French inhabitants, are being shipped into the city from neighboring fisheries and fish merchants are compelled to receive them on account of their contracts to take all the fisherimen catch.

Notwithstanding the fact that fish are so plentiful, local dealers have not lowered the price which remains at 18 cents a pound. It is stated that they intend throwing away what they cannot sell.

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
