

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

FRIDAY, March 3. In the Legislative Council Saturday afternoon Mr. Jones, Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Young, and Mr. McInerney continued the debate on the Reply.

In the House, Mr. Adams argued that the financial ruin Confederation has brought was well-known to New Brunswick publicists. Mr. Landry protested against the School Act clause of the Reply. Mr. Hibbard said he was opposed to the Act but was glad that the power of the Legislature to pass such an Act had been affirmed.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

To-Day's Proceedings.

(Special to the Tribune.)

FRIDAY, March 3. The House opened at 10 o'clock. Mr. Gough took his seat this morning. The Clerk of the House called attention to the inconsistency of the Attorney General's motion respecting a compromise with Mr. Day.

The Attorney General introduced a bill respecting the appointment of Notaries Public. The Official Debates question was again mooted. Mr. Cate did not want any share of the French Debates; and Lindsay thought that those who took the French should have none of the English.

Mr. Hibbard thought the motion should be pressed, and that Day had an ample amount offered, and if unwilling to accept, the House should rescind the contract. Alward again spoke in favor of the motion, and after some discussion the motion was withdrawn.

Mr. Hibbard stated that Day had refused. Hibbard said he could not help the awkward position the committee was in. He had often been that way, and thought that some of the rest had. They deserved no censure. They had been misled by Day, but unintentionally. He was proud that all the members were not printers, like his friend Willis.

Phillips endorsed this. Cram thought the House should substantiate the acts of the committee. Day was no great friend of his, but he wanted to be honorable and support the dignity of the House. The Attorney General's tractor had refused to compromise.

Hon. Mr. White concurred with Hibbard. He said our finances are not in a prosperous condition this year. Last year we were supposed to be. He thought it best to get out of the arrangement if possible.

Napier thought a mere synopsis in the Monitor would be very inappreciable, as no one would know what was contained in it. The Debates would be a cruel waste of money and he had always been opposed to them. The English should not try to crush the respectable French nation. (Hear! hear!) The French nation in this little Province had had much trouble of late. The reporter of the synopsis might take text from the Bible and write on it, and the members would not know what he was writing. He must go against the Debates, for this synopsis would be only once a week and to suit certain parties.

Blanchard thought the French severely dealt with. Other members spoke but merely reiterated what had been said before, and the report was adopted.

Mr. Butler moved that members representing a mixed constituency and taking French Debates should have them deducted from their quota of English. Landry and Adams would refuse to accept the French Debates if this resolution carried.

The Attorney General said if there was a larger quota of the French Debates the quality would be no better. He thought the 1,000 sufficient, and that they should accept them. Lindsay and Beckwith would oppose the resolution. Butler did not want to do an injustice, but would press the resolution. It was lost.

Tibbets moved, and the Attorney General seconded, that "in the opinion of this House the summary be done away with and Redoubt be paid \$150." Girouard and Cate opposed the motion, and it was lost. Mr. Gough asked the Government if there had been any Better Terms Delegation.

The Attorney General suggested that all questions be put in writing. Gough gave notice of a motion on Wednesday asking for all papers respecting Better Terms Delegations, and the result. He also asked the Government if there was any delegation respecting export duties.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

FRIDAY, March 3. The debate continued on proposed amendment in answer to His Excellency's speech. Section 8 was taken up.

Hon. Mr. Jones expressed himself opposed to this paragraph of the reply, and as consultation with other Maritime Pro-

vinces has been proposed, wished to ask his hon. friend, if he thought the Government have not promised a legal gentleman in York County a position on a commission under this section to revise the Statutes. Hon. Mr. Jones.—It is not for this purpose that the Government have put in Section 8, but I will answer that the Government made no such promise.

Hon. Mr. Jones.—This section is necessary; regulations will be opened which will be a Union of the Maritime Provinces, and the present time is not the opportune for such revision. The Baristers Society and press have not asked for it. Hon. President explained that the old revision was carried out by Chief Justice Chipman, aided by two legal gentlemen; and in the present revision he hoped gentlemen of the Bar would voluntarily give aid.

Hon. Mr. Jones.—I Judge, &c., think necessary to revise, let the Government distinctly state the fact and inform us of the cost. Hon. Mr. Hamilton.—It is not in opposition to Government that is discussed, but to give to the country our individual views on it. I am not revising the Statutes, but my own experience the revision was made by the late Chief Justice, and I am not benefited. Our vote on reply to address does not bind any of us to support the Government. Considering the depletion of our Treasury, I think the present section unnecessary. To get Better Terms the Government must exercise more economy.

Hon. Mr. Chandler.—It is unwise for the Government to ask for money to revise the laws at present. A Maritime Union will inevitably come, and we ought to keep our finances in a good position so as to secure good terms in the Union. Section 8 of the Reply passed. Section 9 and 10 were taken up and passed. Section 11 was moved.

Hon. Mr. McInerney.—I desire to enter my protest against this section. I do not think the Supreme Court have power to pronounce judgment on the School Act. Mr. Smith, Dominica Inspector of Steamboats, at the request of Mr. John Murphy, made an examination of the Corporation boiler which exploded last week, and fully agreed with the verdict of the Coroner's Jury as to the cause of the accident. The boiler was burned, and this was the direct and only cause of the accident, which fully agrees with the evidence of Mr. Percy, the expert and an official also examined the construction of the boiler, and considered it defective in some parts. By the Dominion Act applying to steamboats, which only allows a pressure equal to one-fifth of the tensile strength of the metal per square inch, not more than 25 lbs. would be allowed. This, however, was not the greatest amount of steam that could be used with safety. On locomotive boilers a greater pressure is allowed than on steamboats, consequently this boiler could have been run at a much higher pressure than 25 lbs.

Shipping Notes. Ship Richard Wright.—A headboard, marked "Richard Wright," was washed ashore near St. David's Head, about the 14th ult. The ship Richard Wright sailed from Liverpool for Bombay on the 1st ult. The R. W. was built at Contreway Bay in 1872 by Messrs. Nevis, Fraser & Co., and is owned by themselves and parties in Liverpool. As the headboard of a number of vessels has been washed off in the Channel during the heavy gales which have prevailed, there may be nothing in the above.

The bark W. T. Harwood, Dowley master, detained in port several days owing to a severe list raised by her having made a little water while lying in the Parkfield's bed at Merritt's wharf loading; she was taken to the buoys off Robertson's wharf on Friday, her deckload trimmed, and some of the water pumped out of her, and is now ready to sail. The W. T. H. is named after a well known ship broker in London.

Canadian, British and Foreign.

NEW YORK, March 1. The public debt has been reduced \$5,000,000 during the month. Senator Eastman will probably be censured, but not expelled, if the Senate have an opportunity to act on his case, which is doubtful. A joint resolution congratulating Spain on the formation of a republic, passed the House to-day. Gold 114 1/2 to 115; exchange 1084 to 1094.

LONDON, March 1. Consols 92 1/2 to 93; breadstuffs quiet. An unknown steamer foundered this morning in the Mersey, below Liverpool, with all on board. The bark Boyne has been wrecked in Montserrat Bay, west coast of England, and 15 of the crew drowned. It is generally considered that to-day's sitting in the National Assembly will be one of the most important since the establishment of the republic. It is expected that the Right and Left will insist upon a distinct statement from Thiers of his policy.

NEW YORK, March 3. FRISK reported this morning at Brooklyn—loss \$40,000; at Toledo, Ohio—loss \$40,000; and at New Orleans—loss \$25,000. MARINE DISASTERS. The steamer George S. Wright is supposed to have been lost off Cape Canton a few days ago with all on board, about twenty persons.

CONGRESS. It is now thought that all appropriation bills will be passed by Tuesday morning, and extra session of Congress be unnecessary. LONDON, March 2. ANOTHER MARINE DISASTER. There has been a collision in the Irish Channel (time not stated) between ships Chacabuco and Torch, sinking both vessels and drowning twenty-four of the Chacabuco's crew.

FIRE IN DUBLIN. A large tar manufactory in Dublin was burned to-day—loss \$250,000. LAUNCH. The English frigate Iron-clad Raleigh, was launched at London on Saturday. WHOLESALE FORGERY. Gigantic frauds on the Bank of England have been discovered, committed by one Warren, alias Horton, an American, by forging Rothschild's and other financial houses.

AMADEUS will probably leave Lisbon for Italy on Monday the 3rd. FRANCE. In the French Assembly Deferre declared that the compact of Bordeaux will be maintained by the Government. The cabinet and cabinet members are in the hands of the Conservatives.
