Charles Carter, formerly of Appin and later of Montreal, passed away on July 14th after a short illness, in his 52nd year. He leaves a widow and one daughter, besides his father, two sisters and a brother. He was buried at his old home town of Appin.

Mrs. Mary Finlayson, one of the oldest residents of Dutton, passed away at her home on Friday afternoon, death being due to the infirmities of old age. Mrs. Finlayson was in her 84th year, and had always enjoyed good health, death following an illness of only one day. She is survived by one son, Alex. Finlayson, Dunwich, and four daughters, Misses Christina, Florence and Kathleen at home, and Miss Margaret of Detroit. The funeral took place on Saturday to the Kerr cemetery, Dunwich.

Some fifteen leading citizens of Strathroy came over to Glencoe on Thursday evening to invite the people of Glencoe and vicinity to participate in a demonstration to the boys of Midland who enlisted in the service in the late war. The deputation was received by a hastily called public meeting in the town hall at which it was decided to co-operate with Strathroy in entertaining the boys at that town on Tuesday next. An adjournment of the meeting was made until Tuesday evening to complete arrangements.

The annual Knapdale garden party held on the school grounds of section 7, Mosa, Wednesday evening was a splendid success, the proceeds amounting to \$355. A program of exceptional merit was presented, and in the afternoon there was an interesting football match between Newbury and S. S. 7 in which the latter team had four goals to the good. Proceeds will go towards providing a tent to the memory of the boys of the section who fell in the war.


