Streetsville United Church will be held in co-operation with St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, at 10 a.m. each Sunday.

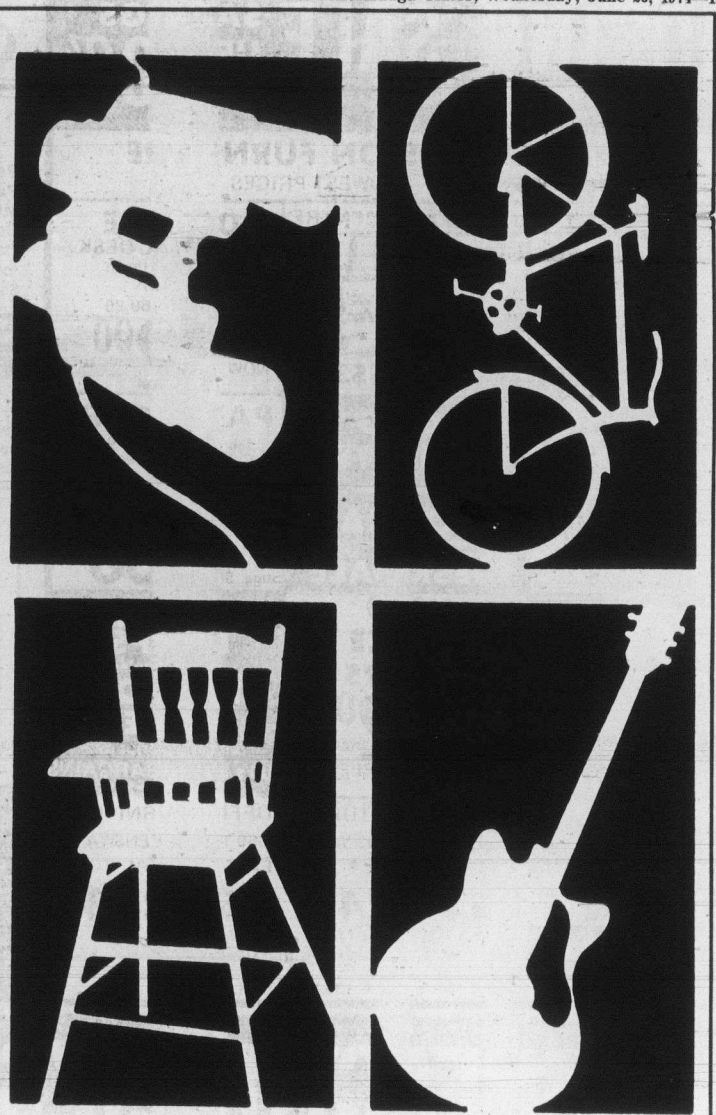
