For antique carriage dealer John Perry one such ancient road coach ancient road coach represents up to a \$12,000 deal with a collector who can afford to participate in a growing but expensive

On june 9 at 10:30 a.m. 50 horse-drawn vehicles will go on the block at Perry's Britannia Road farm. The auction will attract buyers from all over the continent. Perry held his first such

auction last year and sold \$30,000 worth of equipment. He hopes to triple that total this year.

There was once a time when untold thousands of these auto-predecessors were the main form of short and long distance travel but now the demand among collectors far surpasses the

Perry scoured North America for "pieces" as he calls them and then travelled

European rigs. His prime catch there was an exquisite Landau complete with what is reputed to be gold-plated wheel hubs manufactured by the Burlington Carriage Company of Oxford Street in

London.
The gleaming model of Victorian elegance hasn't lost its ability to impress. Even the most car-oriented visitor to the storage shed can recognize the roots of style that affected early auto design in this century.

But Perry's pearl of the auction is the French park drag coach, France's answer to the American West's stage coach. With a dozen passengers up top and another four inside a leatherlined, cramped com-partment it represented the epitomy of horse-drawn transportation before the steam locomotive took over.



In New Jersey he picked up an ex-tremely rare and superbly rebuilt South African made Cape Cart, a two-wheeled vehicle that was pulled by two horses. For the low budget collector he even offers a \$25 walking plow.

Perry started off in the dairying business and 17 years ago converted the farm into a trucking firm headquarters. Now he concentrates a growing percentage of his time on his hobby-business.

Invitations have been sent out to the members of the Carriage Association of America and major collectors in Europe. With America the addition of 15 to 30 consignment vehicles, the sale promises to become the biggest of its kind since carriages were swept off the road 60 long years ago.
