Kitchen floors were washed several times a day with a disinfectant solution. An expediting order for installation of proper Refrigeration equipment was issued to the Contractor on the job. A temporary Officers' Bar was inaugurated.  F/O B.P.Furneaux discharged from Hospital, with the discharge of the other airman noted as admittant under date of the 5th.

		Work of grading parade square commenced. A citizen of Belleville objected to the work being done on Sunday, but with a few well chosen words of advice from the Commanding Officer, did not, as threatened, carry out his intention of bringing the subject of working on Sunday to the attention of the Dominion Government.  The Station Fire Fighters commenced daily fire inspections and otherwise organized fire protection, by the locating at advantageous points such equipment, as had been received. Fire Hose for stand pipes was in a bad state of repair, and much had to be taken down for shipment to factories for repair of couplings.
