In some respects, however, Canada has nothing to learn even from France. There is the treatment of consumptives,

for instance. Senator Herriot, Mayor of Lyon, a leading spirit in organizing the famous Joffre school for the wounded, in a recent speech declared that nothing had been done for the tuber-culous soldiers, though departmental (or county) associations had been called into existence for this purpose. In Canada, the Military Hospitals Commission has attacked this problem with determination. Special sanatoria have been eponed, and no effort is being spared to restore the patients to health.

It is worth noticing, by the way, that Senator Herriot, as the result of experience, urges the immediate necessity of checking the ravages of alcohol. He declares that this scourge, like that other "white plague" consumption, must be completely and rapidly destroyed in order to save the future of the country's vital power.
