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still remain.

Lumber and forest products are essential basic commodities. They represent a very large natural resource of the country and much difficulty has been experienced by different operators in disposing of their output. Just as strong a case was made by the lumber producers as was made by the grain growers of the West.

It is very certain that railway rates have been drastically increased on lumber products. The commodity moves on a mileage basis. The rate situation in Eastern Canada is shown by the following table:
