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- The "statute" of the Vatican was a solution unilateral, italian, purely legal and statutory, given by the Act of Guarantees of 1871. A bilateral solution, governed by international law, was given by the Agreements of Latran of the 11th February, 1929.
- By various treaties of 1815, Prussia, Austria and Russia took the city of Cracow under their protection. They assumed powers which belonged to the city.
- Islands by the Treaties of the 5th November 1815, between Great Britain, Austria, Prussia and Russia was similar to that of Cracow. The Islands, however, were not subjected to a consortium but to a single Power, Great Britain.
- From the foregoing it may be inferred that the proposed "international statute" for Germany is a situation of mandate or trusteeship established by an Act to which Germany will not be a contracting party. The situation envisaged is likely a perpetuation in a more or less modified form of the status established by the Declaration of Berlin of the 5th June 1945.
