North Atlantic Triangle, The Interplay of Canada, the United States and Great Britain, Toronto, Ryerson, 1945; repr. Toronto, McClelland and Stewart, (Carleton Library Series, 1966)

A brilliant synthesis of the relationships, economic and social as well as diplomatic, between the three countries constituting the triangle. Revised and updated bibliography in the 1966 edition.

Canada, Department of External Affairs, Foreign Policy for Canadians, Ottawa, Information Canada, 1970; also Mitchell Sharp, "Canada-U.S. Relations: Options for the Future", <u>International Perspectives</u>, special issue, Autumn, 1972

Six booklets incorporating the conclusions of the foreign policy review undertaken by the Trudeau government after it took office in 1968. Topics treated include Canada's policies towards the United Nations and various regions, while the Sharp paper deals with relations with the United States.

Dobell, Peter.

Canada's Search for New Roles: Foreign Policy in the Trudeau Era, London, Oxford University Press, 1972

Written for the British reader but manages to provide a useful analysis of the content of Canadian external policies in the early 'seventies for a wider audience.

Eayrs, James.

The best brief examination of the process by which foreign policy has been made in Canada.

Glazebrook, G.P. deT.

A History of Canadian External Relations, Toronto, Oxford University Press, 1942, 1950; rev. and repr. Toronto, McClelland and Stewart, (Carleton Library Series) 2 vols., 1966

A standard history for many years, this work comes only to 1939, with a bibliographical essay relating to later years.
