




The Kirby Mower

Popular interest centres in the reaper. This latter, The Kirby as made by the Harris firm, followed closely the Reaper evolution of the Massey in Newcastle and both of them were contemporaneous in development with machines made by similar firms in the United States. The Harris hand-rake reaper was the "Kirby," first made at Beamsville and improved at Brantford. In its day it is doubtful if at the time a better machine reaper than the "Kirby"-or more than one or two as goodwere made anywhere in America-which was by this time the world's headquarters for harvesting machinery.
