### WHITNEY TO HARCOURT.

The Ridgeway Dominion points out that, speaking at Havelock, East Peterborough, on Friday, Mr. Whitney said "He was sorry that Hon. Mr. Harcourt, Minister of Education, speaking at Ridgeway the other day, had uttered a slander against him by saying that it was his (Mr. Whitney's) custom to deprecate the forest resources of the province, and that he had declared the last pine tree was gone. Not a word of that was true, and he was inclined to think Mr. Harcourt had been misreported."

Mr. Harcourt had also attributed to him (Mr. Whitney) the phrase that New Ontario was the "land of the stunted poplar." He defied any man or newspaper to cite the time and place in which he made the statement. The majority of the people of the province were surely aware that for years the opposition had endeavored to find out the extent and value of the timber and mineral land of the province.

### TAXATION AND REPRESENTATION.

The following stinging indictment of Ontario Government methods is from the London News, Independent.

It is unofficially announced that the date of the bye-election in East Kent has been fixed for November 11. The Ontario Government has acted wisely in deciding to hold an election at once, and permitting representation for the people all the time.

But the people of West Huron have been without representation in the Ontario Legislature since 1898. During that time or a portion of it litigation has barred a bye-election. But all legal controversy was at an end months ago, and yet no sound of a bye-election has been heard.

Why should the people of East Kent, who have been without representation for only two months or less, have a bye-election, and the people of West Huron deprived of representation for three years, have no bye-election?

The reason evidently is that East Kent is an easy riding to carry—a sure thing and a Government victory. On the other hand West Huron is a close fight and dangerous to the Government. It is good tactics for a Government party to go into a general election just after the conclusion of a successful bye-election, but it is disastrous to go into a general election after an unsuccessful bye-election.

Of course the people of West Huron are deprived of representation, but what has the Ontario Government to do with the people of Ontario?

If Hon. J. R. Stratton and his associates would cease for a time to speak of Mr. Whitney's anarchy and devote themselves to doing the right thing with all sections of people this Province would be better served.

We hear of representation and taxation and all that. The people of West Huron are paying taxes, pouring in fees to Provincial institutions, but

just because they think politically, they must be deprived of representation.

Up to within a few hours of the convention at which he accepted nomination, Mr. Lee was going about emphatically declaring that he could not and would not be a candidate. Surely he cannot hope to repeat such tactics successfully. We may just as well point out that, in the language of the street, the other aspirants are "onto the racket," and cannot be humbugged again.

Mr. Lee's statements, in view of his past actions, are properly subject to some discount, the more so as we find him reported in the Windsor Record of Wednesday, 23rd inst., as follows:—

"It was a great surprise to me when I was nominated," said Lee this morning. "I knew nothing about it two hours before my name came up."
