STEERED DUPES ON DETECTIVES

Green Goods man Plays Practical Joke with Disastrous Ending.

Stage-Struck Victim is Now Languishing Within the Precincts of the Jail.

Guelph, Nov. 25.—Led on by the glare of the footlights and a desire to obtain money to go on the stage, Homer R. Harris, a farmer, of Holyrood, Bruce County, was arrested today at Palmerston by Inspector Joseph Rogers on a charge of attempting to purchase counterfeit money. Harris was brought to Guelph and given a preliminary hearing before Police Magistrate Saunders, who committed him for trial. He elected to be tried summarily, and was taken before County Judge Chadwick. The prisoner pleaded guilty and will be sentenced in the course of a few days.

The events leading up to the arrest and conviction of Harris are interesting. Some time in July of this year Inspector Rogers received a letter from a man named Homer R. Harris, of Holyrood, Bruce County, wanting "to get terms." The letter was addressed to J. F. Rogers, Game Warden, Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Mr. Rogers replied asking for particulars, and received a second letter from Harris, in which the writer stated that he had been recommended to write to Mr. Rogers "for to put him on to the way to get rich quick." Mr. Rogers answered all the letters, and a vigorous correspondence was kept up during the summer. Harris sent a dollar, asking for samples of the counterfeit money, and Inspector Rogers sent clippings of a counterfeit one and a two-dollar bill. Harris replied that the bills would have looked better if they had not been clipped.

Harris subsequently wrote, enclosing \$10, and wanted five and ten-dollar bills to do the same. He went on to say that he could raise \$125, and after he got a start he would be a good customer. After further correspondence an appointment was made for a meeting at a hotel in Palmerston yesterday. The understanding being that Harris should go to Rogers' rooms, and the production of the letters which passed would be the means whereby each could identify the other.

This morning Inspector Rogers and Grear arrived in Palmerston about noon from Toronto. Mr. Grear went to the room, after they had registered at the hotel. He had in his possession the letters written by Harris. Inspector Rogers waited in the office a few minutes, and his attention was presently attracted to a young man apparently about twenty-four years of age. He was clean shaven, had long dark curly hair, and was neatly dressed in black clothes, and wore a white tie. The new-comer sauntered carelessly to the register, and took down a white hanging there, apparently to brush his clothes, but glancing at the register. He evidently found the name, and in a few minutes went to the room. Inspector Rogers followed soon afterwards, and arrested both Inspector Grear and Harris. He took possession of the letters, and found on searching Harris that he had in his possession \$121 of good money. He had wanted to purchase about \$400 of counterfeit for this money, buying at the rate of \$30 for \$100 of the "queer."

Inspector Rogers was seen after the preliminary hearing, and said that Harris had admitted his guilt, and that he did not want a lawyer to defend him. Harris was asked what he wanted the money for, and replied that he had worked on the farm all his life with his father. He didn't like it, and never had. He had a good voice, and sang in the Methodist choir at Ripley. In fact, he had taken a most active part in the anniversary services held there on Sunday last. He was anxious to get money to train his voice, and wanted to go on the stage. He knew no easier way to make it. He had worked hard all summer, from early morning till late at night, drawing milk to the factory and drudging on the farm. He had raked and saved the \$121 in order to purchase this counterfeit money. He wanted large bills in order to get a quicker return.

Harris never suspected Grear during the whole interview, and was stunned when arrested. The following typewritten letter, which was received by Harris, led him to communicate with Inspector Rogers:

"Will tell you what to do. Address a letter to J. F. Rogers, Game Warden, Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Tell him what you wish, and that he is recommended from me here as a good party. What he will do for you, I don't know. Can find that out for yourself."

Inspector Rogers said that this letter had been received by Harris from G. L. Collins, who had been arrested last fall in Fort Erie for issuing circular letters advertising counterfeit money. Collins was convicted at Fort Erie and sentenced to eighteen months. He appealed, and was released on a technicality after serving six months. Mr. Rogers thought that Collins had taken this method of getting square with him, and thought he would cause the inspector some trouble. Collins returned to Brookfield, N. Y., and had evidently had some correspondence with Harris. The inspector said he had received probably forty such letters like the above from different parts of the States. He

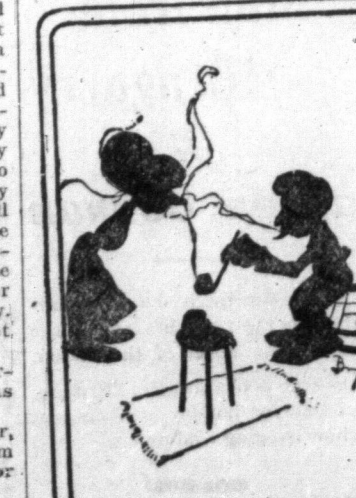
