mirably. But matters were not im-
proved after all, for the lender was at
the party and followed Murger every-
where, exclaiming in tones of audible
good nature: "Do just what you like
with my coat, old man. Tear it right
up the back or cover it with grease—
just as you like. I shall never say a
word. Only too delighted to lend it to
you."

A WONDERFUL MONSTER.

Description of a New Battleship in
the Seventeenth Century.

Is it true that our ram battleships are
but old inventions in new forms? It
looks like it. Some one has unearthed
a curious announcement, which ap-
peared in the Mercurius Politicus for
Dec. 6, 1653, to the effect, as stated by
the Dundee Advertiser, that "the
monster called a ship built at
Rotterdam by a French engineer is
now launched." In a description of the

struments and wheels (without masts
and sails) as swift as the moon or at
least thirty miles every hour. (2) Both
ends are made alike, and the ship can

hours will destroy a whole fleet. (4)

whales in Greenland, so that a hun-
dred ships may be laden in fourteen
days. (6) She may be used to break
down any pier or wooden work with
great ease."

ROY'S SINKS YANKEE SHIP

Happened On Formosa a Week Ago—Crew Saved.

Washington, D.C., May 29.—Con-
firmation has been received here from
Shanghai of the press report that the
Russian warship has sunk an un-
known American ship off the Chinese
coast. The crew was saved. Heavy gun
fire is plainly heard to the northward.

Tokio, May 29.—The name and des-
tination of the American steamer
which Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky is
reported to have sunk off Formosa,
about May 21, is unknown here. Al-
though nothing is known here about
the case it is expected in official cir-
cles that Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky
will claim that the vessel was cruis-
ing.

Had to Do It.
St. Petersburg, May 29.—Nothing is
known at the Admiralty of the re-
ported sinking of an unknown Ameri-
can steamer off Formosa by Vice-Admiral
Rojdestvensky. It is recognized at the
Admiralty as quite possible that Roj-
destvensky may have been compelled
by military necessity to destroy a
neutral.

Position Unchanged.
St. Petersburg, May 29.—Gen. Lin-
evitch, in a despatch, dated May 28, re-
ports that there is no change in the
position of the armies in Manchuria.

Will Use Arms.
Warsaw, Russian Poland, May 29.—
Governor-General Maslovitch during
Saturday night issued a proclamation
directing the troops to restore order
and to use their arms without hesita-
tion.

Bomb Throwers Arrested.
Baku, Caucasasia, May 29.—The man
who assassinated Prince Nakhichev,
Governor of Baku, Wednesday, by
throwing a bomb at his carriage, has
been arrested in a factory.

Three Jews Killed.
Lodz, May 29.—A procession of
Jews carrying red flags Saturday came
into conflict with Cossacks, who fired,
killing three persons and wounding
several others.

Twenty-Two Armenians Killed.
St. Petersburg, May 29.—Twenty-two
Armenians and two Muscovites were
killed on Thursday at Nakhichevan, in
the district of Erivan, as the result of
the renewal of hostilities between Ar-
menians and Moslems. The number of
injured has not been ascertained. Four
bodies were found incriminated. All the
Armenian shops were pillaged. The
Village of Pasakend and its vicinity
were completely destroyed. The inhabi-
tants fled.

TAKEN OUT OF SHEA'S HANDS.

Chicago Teamsters' Union Executive
Board of the Teamsters' Union.

Chicago, May 29.—The general ex-
ecutive board of the Teamsters' Union
has taken the management of the strike
out of the hands of President Shea,
and it will be managed hereafter by
the members of the executive board and
the local strike committee. After as-
suming control of the strike the ex-
ecutive board issued a statement, which
says:
At the meeting of the general ex-
ecutive board of the International Bro-
therhood of Teamsters, a general dis-
cussion of the present strike was had,
and it was decided unanimously to
continue the struggle along the same
line. We believe the strike should be
confined to Chicago, and to as few
men in Chicago as is possible. We are
opposed to spreading the strike to any
workmen except teamsters. The gen-
eral executive board is hopeful that
peace will soon be established, but any
peace must be on honorable terms so
far as the strikers are concerned.

Marconi's Triumph.

New York, May 29.—The steamer
Campania, which arrived Saturday, re-
ported that she had been in contin-
uous communication with land by means
of wireless telegraphy during the voy-
age. When in midocean the vessel
was in communication with both Amer-
ica and Europe simultaneously, a feat
never before accomplished.

Photographs Mars' Canals.

Cambridge, Mass., May 29.—A tele-
gram was received at the Harvard Ob-
servatory, Saturday night from Prof.
Perceval Lowell, director of the Lowell
Observatory at Flagstaff, Arizona, stat-
ing that the canals of Mars have been
photographed there for the first time.
Several of them appear upon more
than twenty negatives.

Nationalist M. P. Dies Suddenly.

London, May 29.—James Francis
O'Brien, the Nationalist member of
Parliament for Cork since 1895, died
here suddenly yesterday. Mr. O'Brien
was born in 1832.

Million Dollars For Agriculture.

a million dollars in the agricultural
college for this Province.

Robbing Trunks in Italy.

A traveler just returned from Italy
reports that a trunk belonging to one
of his party was cut open on the rail-
way between Rome and Genoa and
clothes abstracted to the value of £20.
When he consulted the British consul
on the subject he heard that a lady had
been at the consulate a few minutes
before who had lost the whole of her
valuable jewelry in the same way. It

police and the railway companies be-

is in Italy, and the knowledge that this
is so must keep many people out of the
country, especially wealthy travelers,
whom it is the interest of the authori-
ties to encourage. In the meantime I
would point out to travelers in Italy
that the insurance of luggage against
theft is a precaution that should al-
ways be taken.—London Truth.
