THE PROBS

Toronto, July 24.—The barometer is high over the eastern part of the continent and also over the Western Provinces, while a shallow trough of low pressure extends from the Great Lakes to the southwest States. The weather has been mostly fine and moderately warm from Ontario eastward, and cool with local showers from Superior westward.

BORDEN IN LONDON.

Brookville Times: Premier Borden is—as may be expected—getting a right royal welcome from London, and it must be said that he is representing Canada with dignity and great credit to the country. His utterances have been serious, broad-minded, but full of confidence hope in the outcome of the war and the participation of Canada in Imperial problems when war ends. Altogether, Canadians have much reason to be proud of their Premier. He is a man of Imperial stature, firm in his Canadian independence, yet equally firm in his grasp of what the British Empire means. It is well for Canada that such a man is Premier of Canada at this crisis in Imperial affairs.

GERMANY'S STAND TAKEN. Berlin, via London, July 24.—The American note was not published in this morning's Berlin papers but probably will appear in the afternoon editions. Count Ernest Von Reventlow in an article in the Tages Zeitung headed 'Ungrounded anxieties,' declares that no matter what the note contains, the submarine campaign will not be restricted. So far as the German empire is concerned he says, there can be no further question of its attitude. The German stand has been taken, count Von Reventlow asserts, and it will be maintained.

The Lokal Anzeiger says the contents of the American note do not deprive the possibility of further negotiations between Washington and Berlin.

WE MUST, AND SHALL, WIN. London Daily Express.—The great mass of the German people still believe that triumph will be theirs, and are determined to fight on to the bitter end. We must be equally determined. They are better organized than ourselves, and every bit as brave. But they have neither our numbers nor our greater resources. Nothing but Great Britain's failure to rise to her destiny can prevent Europe's speedy delivery from the brutish attempt to throw her back to complete subjection to medieval tyranny. We are far behind. After ten months of war we are beginning to prepare for it, but we have set our hand to the task and we shall win.

TIMES AND DAILY MAIL URGE GOVT.

To Declare Cotton a Contraband and Graphic Makes Complaint.

London, July 24.—The Times and the Daily Mail again to-day urge the government to declare cotton contraband and to undertake the scheme for the purchase of the textile as outlined by the Times yesterday. This plan contemplated the purchase by the government from the Southern cotton exchanges of the amount of cotton that would normally have gone to Germany and Austria-Hungary and also of the cotton exports to Holland, Belgium, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland, at the same time declaring cotton absolute contraband. The Daily Graphic also complains of the inaction of the government on this question and says the matter is becoming a grave danger to the country, as unless something is done before the new cotton crop is available Germany will be able to get all the cotton she requires.

"It will be a gross public scandal if this matter is not dealt with before parliament rises, to save our soldiers," The Times, in an editorial dealing with the position of the United States generally refers to President Wilson's third note to Germany and declares that it "seems likely that Wilhelmstrasse will again take refuge in the evasive and dilatory tactics hitherto employed."

The newspaper adds that there is a limit to the successful employment of such manoeuvres and declares Germany is presuming upon American patience and pacifism as she presumed upon British patience and pacifism last year.

Editorial protests against Washington's intimation to Great Britain that American rights will be insisted upon the principles of international law as hitherto established, as being a manifestly excessive claim and not in accordance with the example set by the American Government and American courts during the American civil war. The Times concludes by saying that the hope that when the British Government's decisions on this point are taken, the United States will give them sympathetic and friendly consideration.

THREE-FRONT BATTLE GROWS MORE INTENSE

Russians Hurl the Enemy Back After Smashing Wire Entanglements

By Special Wire to the Courier. Petrograd, via London, July 24.—The furious three front battle for Warsaw is growing more intense daily. On July 22 the Germans smashed the entanglements at Gniwow, six miles southwest of Ivangorod, but are said to have been hurled back with heavy losses by a determined counter attack.

On July 21, the Germans in the centre of the Lublin-Chelm line suffered cruelly in assaults on the Plaski, Voislavitz and Grubehow positions, according to reports received here. They succeeded in occupying Russian trenches over a wide front, and proceeded to advance northward of the Voislavitz, but it is stated, the Russians encountered them at night in the dense forests and drove them back with much loss, the Russians taking six guns and 500 prisoners.

UNABATED FURY.

The German forces in this region emboldened by their numerous successes, according to Russian accounts, and the Russian commanders have given the Russian troops the highest praise for the extreme energy of the counter-blow. However, the Germans succeeded in regaining some of the ground thus lost in the course of July 22. The battle in the Chelm region has now proceeded for ten days without unabated fury, though the Russian claim that the Germans have been greatly weakened by their losses and that they are approaching the limit of endurance. The Germans are reported to have abandoned their attacks in the direction of Retovetz without making substantial gains.

GERMAN TRENCHES SEIZED. Further southward, on the River Bug in the region of Sokal, the Russians continue meeting offensive with offensive. On the night before July 22, dispatches say, they seized several lines of German trenches and on the 22nd drove the Germans to the outskirts of Sokal. In a counter-attack on Poturjitz, the Austrians were repelled, and the surrendering remnants of the Tenth Jager battalion with its commander, it is reported. On the afternoon of the 21st the Austro German forces occupied Dobrotova, but are said to have been driven out in the evening, surrendering several hundred prisoners.

EFFORTS TO DOVE TAIL.

The fight for Rozan and a crossing of the Narew continues with unabated fury. Meanwhile the Germans have begun active operations east of Rossine aiming, in the opinion of military critics here at the command of the River Shoushata, which flows into the Niemen northeast of Kovno. This is taken by the experts as additional evidence of a German effort to dove-tail the entire operations in the eastern theatre.
