Lower River Logs
A thing that will probably seem
somewhat strange to saw mill men
and loggers is that at the present
time much of the timber for the mills
is being brought from down the
river, towed up in barges by the
steamers. All forenoon the steamer
Wilbur Crummon was moored along-
side the chute of the Ladue mill and
by means of a gin pole was hoisting
logs from a scow and dumping them
in the water handy to be taken up
by the log chute to the mill. Local
Manager W. H. B. Lyon in reply to
a query said that they could now get
logs cheaper to the mill from the
lower river than they could from the
upper, the bunch that was just being
unloaded having been cut on the Six-
teen mile river about 15 miles below
the city, loaded on the barge and the
latter was towed up. It is un-
derstood to be the intent of the
Yukon mill to get the bulk of their
timber this season in a similar man-
ner, the old Eldorado having been cut
down to the mere hull for that pur-
pose. It is claimed a steamer such
as the Tyrrell can shove a barge built
on the lines of the Eldorado loaded
to the guards with logs with com-
parative ease, walking right up the
river with it. The good timber on
the upper Yukon has been so cut off
that that yet standing is so far re-
moved from the water that with the
present methods of logging it is too
expensive to get the logs where they
can be gotten together in a raft.

DUNCAN PROTEST.

Fight is Declared Over 107 Below
Beliveau

A protest from far away Duncan
has just been filed with the gold com-
missioner and he has fixed Tuesday,
August 18, as the day upon which he
will hear it. The plaintiff is Her-
bert Carter who lives at Duncan and
the defendant is James Morphy. Car-
ter alleges that on March 18 of the
present year he staked 107 below Bel-
iveau on Duncan, which he declares
at that time was vacant Dominion
ground. He applied for record on the
19th of the same month which was
refused upon the ground that the
claim was not open to location. Ac-
cording to the records for location in
the name of the defendant who Carter
swears never staked the ground, or if
he did stake it he did not do so ac-
cording to the regulations. He asks
that the grant of Morphy be cancelled
that one be issued to him and that
he recover his costs of the action.

BODY FOUND AT SELKIRK

That of McKernan Who
Was Drowned

Discovered Last Night—Sergeant
Stillman Notifies Major
Cuthbert.

The body of McKernan, formerly
spoken of in Dawson papers as Mc-
Connell, has been found, Major Cuth-
bert having received a telegram from
Sergeant Stillman this morning from
Selkirk to that effect.

McKernan was en route from Van-
couver, B. C., to Dawson and, like
hundreds of others, left lower El-
dorado in a small boat immediately on
receipt of news that the river was
open but before the jam had broken
and while very heavy masses of ice
were still numerous in the river.

On Sunday, May 17th, the small
boat in which McKernan and two
companions were traveling was upset
by coming in contact with a large
mass of ice in the Yukon Crossing. All three
of the men were thrown into the water.
McKernan being a good swimmer and
a very strong man, succeeded in
rescuing his companions but the him-
self was borne down by the running
ice and he was never again seen
alive.

Sergeant Stillman reports that the
body found floating in the river at
Selkirk last night is undoubtedly
that of McKernan although there is
nothing by which identification can
be established other than the cloth-
ing and size of the body. The wire
states that the body is badly decom-
posed and should be buried at once.
Major Cuthbert wired to Selkirk to
take minute note of all things about
the remains for future reference
have it closely examined by the post
office, and if the latter is satisfied
of the cause of death to bury them at
Selkirk.

THISTLE LABELLED

Wages of Seamen Overdue Causes
the Arrest

The steamer Thistle, one of the
Merchants' line of packets, was tied
up last night, being placed under ar-
rest by J. M. Elliker acting as a
deputy marshal. The complaint was
the action of the seamen, the crew,
which has been at work on the ves-
sel since the opening of navigation
the ship being brought in the name
of James Wm. Abbott and fourteen
others, including every employee on
the boat from the captain and pilot
down to the galley boy. The wages
due them range from \$18 to \$20 and
are owing to Henry Bailey, one of the
pilots, the entire sum aggregating
nearly \$5000. The defendant is given
a week in which to answer. Abbott
one of the plaintiffs, has been placed
in charge of the boat representing the
marshal of the territory.

The Merchants is one of the largest
lines on the upper river and has al-
ways been very popular with the
traveling public. There is no diffi-
culty with the La France, which will
leave as usual this evening on her
regular run to Gordon Landing and
other points of the upper river.

BUD HARKIN'S BODY FOUND

Whitehorse, June 22.—A corpse
supposed to be the body of Bud Har-
kin, was discovered floating on the
surface of Lake LaBarge, about two
miles from Upper LaBarge, yesterday
morning.

Mrs. Harkin left on the Dawson
early this morning for the purpose
of identifying the body and bringing
it back to Whitehorse, where it will
be temporarily buried.

Up to Time

Veteran of Many Contests Did
Not Exhibit Generalship of
the Younger Man.

Now that the affair is all over, the
money has been divided and every-
body is satisfied it is not happy it is in
order to say that the nearly 20
years' experience of Joe Choyinski
availed him naught in his contest
with Nick Hurley Thursday night
when the veteran went down and out
before his younger and less season-
hardened opponent.

Twice before the final knockout Joe

could have materially recuperated his
strength and wind by remaining
down at least until the count of
eight. Instead, however, he was up
before the first time at the count of two
and the second time at the count of
four. Of course the time occupied by
the man on the floor for rest is uti-
lized by the man standing for the
same purpose but the man on the
floor, being in greater need of the
time, resuming an rest would profit
more thereby and in this respect
Choyinski did not display the general-
ship which his many admirers as-
cribed to him.

Regarding the counting of the
referee there were no grounds for the
