Their mode of packing tomatees, though effective is very simple. They use light yet strong wicker baskets which hold from 20 to 30 pounds each. The bottoms, sides and ends of these baskets are covered with large sheets of paper, and then the fruits are put carefully in until the baskets are mearly full to the rim. One or two sheets of strong paper are then placed over the top and laced firmly with twine, and the basket is ready for altipment. The Azores and Canary Islands also send large lots to London. From the north of France also come considerable quantities, which are nicely packed with fancy-colored paper shavings. This manner of packing helps to attract buyers to the lots and en-hances their value. For one or two seasons quantities have come from the United States, where the tomato is more extensively grown than in any other country in the world. The dis-tance however, is against this trade, as the fruit is of a very perishable nature.--*Chambers Journat.*
