MILLIONAIRE FOWLER DEAD. LEAVES \$35,000,000 ESTATE.

Deceased Was a Brother of Mrs. Cyrus H. McCormick, of Chicago.

Duluth, Minn. report—Word was received in Duluth to-day from Pasadena, Cal., announcing the death there of Eldridge M. Fowler, aged 70, the rich retired lumberman and Minefee owner, who formerly made his home in Detroit. Mr. Fowler was one of the richest men of the world. His fortune is estimated by a Duluth man who knew him well and had much to do with his interests, at not less than \$35,000,000. The telegram from Pasadena did not announce the cause of death, but friends of Mr. Fowler say he had been afflicted in recent years with kidney trouble. He leaves a widow and two daughters by a former marriage. One of the daughters is Mrs. Arthur H. Fleming, of Pasadena. The other is unmarried. The funeral arrangements was not yet made. Mr. Fowler owned one of the finest homes in California. Mr. Fowler owned one-half of the Fayal and the Adams group of iron mines at Eveleville, on the Mesabla range, and was interested in several thousand acres of land on the western Mesabla, that contains the Hawkins, Crosby and other iron mines. He enjoyed the largest income from the Minnesota mines of any living person. It amounted to \$500,000 a year. He was a Michigan lumberman and he and his associates originally obtained these mineral lands for lumber. The iron vein was discovered subsequently. He was extensively interested in Duluth real estate and in Canadian and Pacific coast timber. E. M. Fowler was a brother of Mrs. Cyrus H. McCormick, of Chicago, whose husband was at the head of the McCormick Harvester Company, which afterwards became part of the International Harvester Company. He was a director of the latter corporation at the time of his death. Mr. Fowler was a self-made man. He made his start in life in the lumber business in Michigan, many years ago. Less than a year ago he was wedded to his housekeeper at Pasadena, Miss Helen Brewer, who was an excellent woman in many ways and who is much admired by all who know the Fowlers.
