THE WOMAN WAS DRUNK

And Her Pet Dogs Knewed Her So That She Died.

Explanation of a Murder Mystery in Montreal.

Montreal, March 6.—The mystery surrounding the death of Mrs. George Maynard, who was supposed to have been murdered in her house Thursday night, has been cleared up. Four medical men who examined the body agreed that there was no evidence of murder, but that the wounds appeared to have been caused by an animal's teeth, and not by any instrument. It was shown that Mrs. Maynard kept six dogs in the house, and often when she was on a spree left them unfastened for days, and they became ravenous. The jury rendered a verdict that she died from nervous shock caused by the bites of dogs, while in a state of intoxication. Her husband, who had been held by the police pending the result of the inquest, was released.

The Maynards lived at No. 2 Desjardins street, and until yesterday the police had little doubt of the husband's guilt. Their theory was that Maynard found her intoxicated on his return home, suspected that some other man had been in the house, and that the latter supplied his wife with the whiskey. The police believed that Maynard then killed his wife in a frenzy. The supposed murderer had evidently slept on the blood-soaked bed, as his shirt was stained on the right side.

At the inquest evidence was adduced to show that the couple quarreled a good deal. Maynard swore when he arrived home and found his wife dead that he intended to go out and give the alarm, but was so overcome with the sight that he went into the bedroom and fell into a swoon, in which he remained until daylight, after which he went to his father-in-law's house and told him that his wife was dead.

CHATHAM GRAIN MARKET.

Planet Office Tuesday evening March 5.
John Waddell, of J. B. Stringer & Co., gives The Planet the following grain gossip:

Wheat.—There has been no change in the local market for a long time and 65 cents a bushel is still the ruling price; receipts are coming in about as usual and a fair quantity is offering.

Coarse Grains.—Corn, oats and barley are in demand for local home and foreign consumption. Receipts and stocks are light here, consequently but few orders can be taken. The street prices are: corn 37 to 38c, oats 27 to 28c, and barley 75c to 76c.

Beans.—Market continues dull. There is no business of consequence transacting at present. Dealers look for an improvement in the demand within the course of four weeks, and possibly an improvement also in prices. Best samples ranging under 2 lbs. bring \$1.20 per bushel, commoner samples in proportion.

Dressed Hogs.—J. B. Stringer & Co. and O'Keefe & Drew, both shipped two carloads last week from Chatham and outside points. The consignments were 100 and 125 head respectively. Receipts are light and it will be slow work making up a car-load. Prices for another week will be \$7.50 to \$7.75 per cwt. for desirable weights.

There was a good Saturday market. The milder weather apparently had a good effect on the amount of farm produce brought in. In the sheds eggs were fairly plentiful at 18 cents a doz. quite a large quantity of butter was offered, but the price continued firm at 20c a pound. Chickens were in good demand at from 25c to 30c each. Out doors, potatoes, apples and meats were the chief offerings. Potatoes

sold at 35 to 40c a bag, apples at 20 to 25c a peck, turnips 10c a peck, parsnips 10c a peck, and carrots the same. There was a large quantity of dressed meats offered. Beef sold at 5c to 6c a lb., and pork at 8 to 9c.

Quotations are as follows:—Dairy, tubs and pails, choice, 17-1-2 to 18-1-2c; standard, 16 to 16-1-2c; poor 13 to 15c; dairy prints, choice, 18-1-2 to 19-1-2c; large rolls, good to choice, 17-1-2 to 18-1-2c; creameries, boxes, 21 to 22c; and pounds, 23 to 24c.

Eggs.—Fresh eggs are coming in freely, and prices are easy. Strictly new laid 18c; fresh gathered, 15c; lined, 12 to 14c.

Poultry.—Receipts light and demand fair for choice fresh stock. Prices for bright stock, are as follows:—Turkeys, 11 to 12c; geese, 8 to 8-1-2c; chickens at 40 to 60c; and ducks, at 60 to 80c. Old stored turkeys and geese are quoted 1 to 2c a pound under bright stock. Quite a bit of undesirable frozen stock is coming in. It is hard to sell.

HUNG HIM UP BY A HOOK IN HIS NECK.

Ghastly Cruelities Perpetrated by Bell-gerents in the Colombian Struggle.

San Francisco, March 6.—According to V. H. Putros, a railroad man who has arrived here from South America, the war now in progress in Colombia is characterized by brutality on both sides. In the far interior, Putros says, the federales, before being driven out, slaughtered every person that fell into their hands, excepting only a few women.

At Chapi, a body of adherents of Marroquin, who is retreating, took possession of an inn. Thoroughly Oritz, son of the town, was made prisoner. Having ascertained that the young man's father was a rebel, Zubia ordered him to be tortured. He was finally, according to Putros, impaled by his chin on a hook driven into the floor, and his hands nailed to the sides of the entrance. In this way, after a series of struggles, he died.
