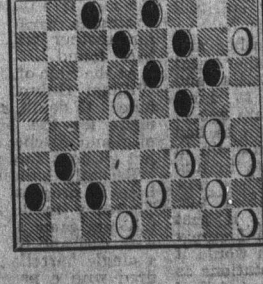
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RIDDLES

The waiter just paused at the table of the hungry guest. "Will you have soup or fish?" he asked. "Don't be so superficial, replied the hungry guest."

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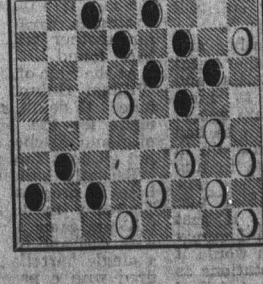
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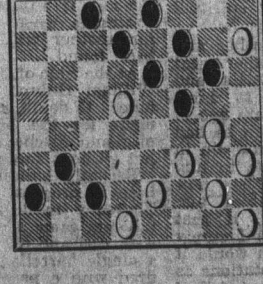
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
