### VERY USEFUL ORGANIZATION

Retail Merchants Association is Organized Under Successful Auspices

### THE OFFICERS ELECTED

The organization meeting of the local Retail Merchants' Association, which was held in Harrison Hall last night, would seem to show that the Association this year will have a larger membership and be better managed than it has ever been before. This Association is for the mutual benefit and protection of the retail merchants, and a deep interest in its success is being manifested by all the more influential merchants in the city.  
The attendance at last night's meeting was large, and a fact worthy of note was that thirty applications for membership in the Association were received last night.  
A strong list of officers was elected with ex-Mayor George W. Cowan as president. The officers for 1907 are as follows:

The appointment of a secretary was left in the hands of the officers elected.  
The proprietors of the local newspapers, Messrs. Stephenson and Woodward, were appointed honorary members of the Association.  
Mr. Cowan presided over the meeting, which was thrown open to discussion. A very interesting address on the benefits to be derived from Retail Merchants' Associations was delivered by Mr. S. A. Brubacher, the hustling organizer for the Provincial Association. Mr. Brubacher gave out a great deal of useful information with regard to the new Peddlars' Act, the new Collecting and Credit Reporting system, as well as many other matters pertaining to the retail trade.  
One very important fact drawn attention to by the organizer, was with regard to the business assessment in Chatham. He said that the merchants here were paying five per cent. more than they were really called upon to pay. They have been paying 35 per cent., while in reality they are only called upon to pay 28 per cent. This was due to a wrong interpretation of the Act, which was quite difficult to understand.  
Committees were appointed at last night's meeting to look into this and other matters.

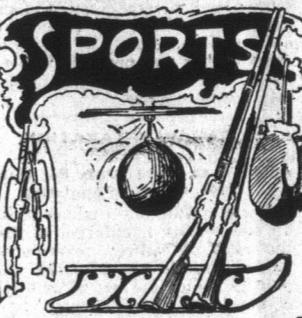

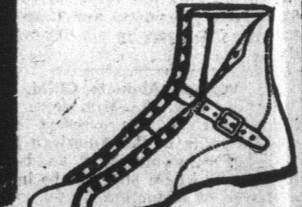
